By Mr. Cabral of New Bedford, for the committee on Human Services and Elderly Affairs, on Senate, Nos. 408, 679, 682, 703 and 705, an Order relative to authorizing the committee on Human Services and Elderly Affairs to make an investigation and study of certain Senate documents concerning contracts, fees and licensing of social service providers (House, No. 5024).

By the same member, for the same committee, on House, No. 4899, an Order relative to authorizing the committee on Human Services and Elderly Affairs to make an investigation and study of a certain House document concerning that the employees of the Department of Social Services be required to wear photo identification (House, No. 5025).

By Mr. Mariano of Quincy, for the committee on Insurance, on a recommitted petition, a Bill to clarify the inclusion of guaranteed products issued out of life insurance company separate accounts (printed as Senate, No. 746).

By Mr. Hall of Westford, for the committee on State Administration, on a petition, a Bill providing that a memorial be erected on the USS Massachusetts to honor those individuals from the Commonwealth who were victims of the September 11, 2001 attack on America (House, No. 4974).

Severally read; and referred, under Rule 7A, to the committee on Steering, Policy and Scheduling.
