Thursday, May 23, 2002.

Met according to adjournment, at eleven o'clock A.M., in an Informal Session, with Mr. O'Flaherty of Chelsea in the Chair (having been appointed by the Speaker, under authority conferred by Rule 5, to perform the duties of the Chair).

Prayer was offered by the Reverend Robert F. Quinn, C.S.P., Chaplain of the House, as follows:

Mr. Scaccia of Boston, for the committee on Rules, on the Order relative to authorizing the committee on Public Safety to make an investigation and study of certain House documents concerning the issuance of firearm identification cards and licenses, the use of chemical mace and the sale of handguns in the Commonwealth (House, No. 4581) reported, in part, asking to be discharged from further consideration of the petition (accompanied by bill, House, No. 1087) of Timothy J. Toomey, Jr., and other members of the General Court for legislation to further regulate the use of firearms,— and recommending that the same be recommitted to the committee on Public Safety. Under

Rule 42, the report was considered forthwith; and it was accepted.

Mr. Scaccia of Boston, for the committee on Rules, on the Order relative to authorizing the committee on Public Safety to make an investigation and study of certain House documents concerning speed limit violations, pedestrian safety, state police, lock-up facilities and other related public safety matters (House, No. 4593) reported, in part, asking to be discharged from further consideration

Of the Bill relative to speed limit violations in marked construction zones (House, No. 867); and

Of the Bill relative to mufflers (House, No. 3593);

And recommending that the same severally be recommitted to the committee on Public Safety.

Under Rule 42, the reports severally were considered forthwith; and they were accepted.

Mr. Scaccia of Boston, for the committee on Rules, on the Order relative to authorizing the committee on Public Service to make an investigation and study of certain House documents concerning active and retired public employees (House, No. 4312) reported, in part, asking to be discharged from further consideration of the petition (accompanied by bill, House, No. 1462) of John J. Binienda relative to creditable service in the public employee retirement system for veterans of World War II,— and recommending that the same be recommitted to the committee on Public Service. Under Rule 42, the report was considered forthwith; and it was accepted.

Mr. Scaccia of Boston, for the committee on Rules, on the Order relative to authorizing the committee on Public Service to make an investigation and study of certain House documents concerning active and retired public employees (House, No. 4655) reported, in part, asking to be discharged from further consideration of the petition (accompanied by bill, House, No. 2038) of the National Association of Government Employees and Brian S. Dempsey that the Commonwealth be required to pay ninety percent of the monthly premium rate for group health insurance for public employees,— and recommending that the same be recommitted to the committee on Public Service. Under Rule

42, the report was considered forthwith; and it was accepted.

Bill making technical amendments to the Uniform Commercial Code covering provisions dealing with secured transactions (House, No. 4575);

Severally referred, under Rule 7A, to the committee on Steering, Policy and Scheduling.

By Mr. Greene of Billerica, for the committee on Commerce and Labor, on House, No. 4855, a Bill providing for liens for molders (House, No. 5079).

By Mrs. Simmons of Leominster, for the committee on Local Affairs, on the Order relative to authorizing the committee on Local Affairs to make an investigation and study of a certain House document concerning the establishment of the Plymouth Development Corporation (House, No. 4983), a Bill establishing the Plymouth Development Corporation (House, No. 4917, changed in section 3, in lines 8 to 14, inclusive, by striking out the sentence contained therein; and in section 18 by adding at the end thereof the following sentence: "All leases shall also provide that the lease shall terminate in the event that the corporation ceases to use the land for the declared public purpose described in section 2.") [Local Approval Received].

By the same member, for the same committee, on a petition, a Bill authorizing the town of Wayland to convey certain park land (House, No. 5059) [Local Approval Received].

By Mr. Casey of Winchester, for the committee on Taxation, on House, No. 4967, a Bill relative to the acceptance of the Community Preservation Act by the town of Buckland (House, No. 5078).

By Mr. Sullivan of Braintree, for the committee on Transportation, on a petition, a Bill designating a certain bridge in the town of Andover as the Joseph A. Horan Bataan and Corrigidor Veterans Memorial Bridge (House, No. 5022).

Severally read; and referred, under Rule 7A, to the committee on Steering, Policy and Scheduling.

By Mr. Hall of Westford, for the committee on State Administration, on a petition, a Bill authorizing the Division of Capital Asset Management and Maintenance to grant certain easements to the town of Plymouth (House, No. 4975). Read; and referred, under Rule 33, to the committee on Ways and Means.

By Mr. Kujawski of Webster, for the committee on Steering, Policy and Scheduling, that the following matters be scheduled for consideration by the House:

By Mr. Rogers of Norwood, for the committee on Ways and Means,
that the following bills ought to pass:

Revising the membership of the Woods Hole, Martha's Vineyard and Nantucket Steamship Authority (House, No. 4991); and

Relative to enhancing English opportunities for all students in the Commonwealth (House, No. 5010);

Severally referred, under Rule 7A, to the committee on Steering, Policy and Scheduling.

Mr. Kujawski of Webster, for said committee, reported that the matters be scheduled for consideration by the House; and, under said rule, they were placed in the Orders of the Day for the next sitting for a second reading.

Engrossed Bill.

The engrossed Bill relative to veteran registration plates for motorcycles (see House, No. 4334, amended) (which originated in the House), in respect to which the Senate had concurred in adoption of the emergency preamble, was passed to be enacted; and it was signed by the acting Speaker and sent to the Senate.

Orders of the Day.

House bills

Relative to the election of survivor benefits (House, No. 4084);

Relative to the use of asthma inhalers by students in public schools (House, No. 4411); and

Granting the widow and children of Steven F. Greene retirement benefits (House, No. 4625);

Severally reported by the committee on Bills in the Third Reading to be correctly drawn, were read a third time; and they were passed to be engrossed. Severally sent to the Senate for concurrence.

The House Bill relative to the unemployment insurance system (House, No. 4452), reported by the committee on Bills in the Third Reading to be correctly drawn, was read a third time.

Pending the question on passing the bill to be engrossed, Mr. Greene of Billerica moved that it be amended by striking out section 17 and inserting in place thereof the following section:

“SECTION 17. Sections 7 and 9 of this act shall take effect relative to computation dates occurring not less than 90 days after the effective date of this act. Section 8 shall take effect relative to new initial claims filed on or after October 6, 2002. Section 10 shall take effect relative to computation dates occurring on or after September 30, 2002. Section 11 shall take effect as of December 31, 2000, except that the election of any tribe as defined in section 3306(u) of the Federal Unemployment Tax Act, which is subject to the provisions of chapter 151A of the General Laws as of the effective date of this act, to make payments in lieu of contributions shall not be effective until January 1 following the effective date of this act. Sections 14 and 15 shall take effect relative to benefits paid on or after July 1, 2002.”; and by inserting before the enacting clause the following emergency preamble:

“*Whereas*, The deferred operation of this act would tend to defeat its purpose, which is to forthwith further regulate the unemployment insurance system, therefore it is hereby declared to be an emergency law, necessary for the immediate preservation of the public convenience.”.

The amendments were adopted; and the bill (House, No. 4452, amended) was passed to be engrossed. Sent to the Senate for

concurrence.
