Papers from the Senate.

A Bill relative to automatic amusement devices (Senate, No. 1350, amended by adding at the end thereof the following section:

"SECTION 2. This act shall take effect on December 31, 2005."; and by inserting before the enacting clause the following emergency preamble:

"Whereas, The deferred operation of this act would tend to defeat its purpose, which is forthwith to exempt automatic amusement devices from certain requirements, therefore it is hereby declared to be an emergency law, necessary for the immediate preservation of the public convenience.") (on a petition), passed to be engrossed by the Senate, was read; and it was referred, under Rule 33, to the committee on Ways and Means.

A Bill authorizing the town of Auburn to convey a certain parcel of land (Senate, No. 2162) (on a petition) [Local Approval Received], passed to be engrossed by the Senate, was read; and it was referred, under Rule 7A, to the committee on Steering, Policy and Scheduling.

Of the committee on Children and Families, asking to be discharged from further consideration Of the petition (accompanied by bill, Senate, No. 69) of Robert S. children, Creedon, Jr. for legislation to promote the permanent placement of placements. children with fit parents;

Of the petition (accompanied by bill, Senate, No. 70) of Robert S. Children in meed of services.

And recommending that the same severally be referred to the committee on the Judiciary.

Severally accepted by the Senate, were considered forthwith, under Rule 42; and they were accepted, in concurrence.

By Mr. DeLeo of Winthrop, for the committee on Ways and Elevator Means, that the Bill relative to elevator license examinations (Senate, No. 2216, amended) ought to pass. Referred, under Rule 7A, to the committee on Steering, Policy and Scheduling.

By Mrs. Owens-Hicks of Boston, for the committee on Children drild and Families, on a petition, a Bill relative to the mandatory reporting abuse. of child abuse (House, No. 3868).

By Mr. Honan of Boston, for the committee on Housing, on condominiums. a petition, a Bill further regulating annual meetings of condominiums (House, No. 3159).

By the same member, for the same committee, on a petition, senior a Bill relative to senior housing (House, No. 3189).

By Mr. O'Flaherty of Chelsea, for the committee on the Judi-Marion ciary, on a petition, a Bill establishing a sick leave bank for Marion Dawicki. Dawicki, an employee of the Trial Court (House, No. 4554).

By Mr. Kaufman of Lexington, for the committee on Public Sick leave Service, on a petition, a Bill relative to sick leave banks (House, banks. No. 271).
