Subsequently Mrs. Harkins, for the committee, reported that they had attended to the duty assigned them, and that the Governor had stated that he would attend forthwith and administer the oaths of office.

Soon afterward His Excellency the Governor, Mitt Romney, accompanied by Her Honor the Lieutenant-Governor, Kerry Healey, the Honorable William Francis Galvin, Secretary of the Commonwealth, the Honorable A. Joseph DeNucci, Auditor of the Commonwealth, The Honorable Timothy P. Cahill, Treasurer and Receiver-General of the Commonwealth, and the Honorable Council came in; the oaths and affirmation required by the Constitution and laws were administered by the Governor to the members-elect then present, and were subscribed by them; after which His Excellency declared that the House was duly qualified to enter upon the discharge of its duties.

Speaker DiMasi then made remarks to the members, guests, employees, and to the citizens of the Commonwealth, as follows:—

More than a few years ago — I stood in this chamber as a newly elected member of this House. I can still recall the awe and wonder of that morning, surrounded by so much history, tradition, and accomplishment. I hoped that perhaps one day, I could meet the expectations of those who had chosen me to represent them, and I dreamed that perhaps — in some small way — I could honor the trust they placed in me by making a positive difference in their lives. But never did I dream that one day, I would be Speaker of the House.

So I begin with a heartfelt “thank you.” Thank you for your faith and confidence, and thank you for again choosing me to serve as your Speaker. This responsibility has been both invigorating and humbling, and I look ahead to the next two years with energy, humility, and a profound confidence that working together we will accomplish great things. Together, no challenge is too daunting; no issue is too difficult; no obstacle is too great for us to overcome.

To Brad Jones: Two years ago, when I was elected Speaker, I thanked you for giving me a spirited race for the position. This time around, I gained two votes. Brad, how about making it unanimous next time?

This House was first gavelled into session more than three centuries ago. Over those years, Massachusetts has been blessed with a long and distinguished roll of statesmen who have held the gavel: Josiah Quincy, Leverett Saltonstall, Tip O’Neill.

This afternoon, we are honored to have with us the most recent additions to that long roll of distinguished statesmen: Bob Quinn, Dave Bartley, Tom McGee, George Keverian, Charlie Flaherty, and Tom Finneran. Thank you, gentlemen, for your invaluable leadership, for your many contributions to our Commonwealth, and for your enduring friendship.

I would also like to welcome Secretary Galvin, Treasurer Cahill, Auditor DeNucci, the distinguished members of the Governor’s Council, the Judiciary, my good friend Mayor Tom Menino, newly-elected City Council President Maureen Feeney and the honorable members of the Boston City Council, and my friends and colleagues in government.

To my friends and neighbors from the Third Suffolk District: thank you for giving me your support and trust. Your confidence in me gives me strength and inspiration. You should know that I am honored to be your voice on Beacon Hill. Everyday I do my best to preserve and protect the character and integrity of our neighborhoods whenever and wherever I can.

And to the most important people in my life: my family. Thank you to Debbie, Ashley, and Christian — you have graced my life with your love and support and for that I will be always grateful.

And now let us look to the future.

It is well within our ability to make the legislative session that begins today among the most productive in the history of our state. The citizens of our great Commonwealth have affirmed our record

again and again. They agree with us — political posturing does nothing to advance their hopes and aspirations.

Ladies and gentlemen, the tide has turned. Change is with us. It is a change that brings with it great promise — the type of promise that will only serve to build on our recent accomplishments.

Last session, we led the way in life-saving stem cell research, enacted a comprehensive economic stimulus package, streamlined our state's cumbersome permitting process, and passed the first increase in the minimum wage since 2001. As a result, research is thriving. Our economy is growing. Jobs are being created. And our working families will have a better standard of living.

We delivered record levels of local aid as well as record levels of Chapter 70 education funding to our cities and towns.

On April 4, 2006, this House of Representatives voted for landmark health care reform to provide quality health care that is affordable and accessible for virtually every man, woman, and child in Massachusetts. In so doing, our comprehensive, innovative, and compassionate plan captured the attention, the respect, and the imagination of the entire country.

The start of every new legislative session marks a new beginning — but the potential and opportunities before us today are clear and palpable. As the people's representatives, we have a responsibility — a mandate — to move our Commonwealth forward. What challenges do we face? And how will we respond?

I believe that we are facing an energy crisis here in Massachusetts. It must be addressed quickly and comprehensively. Shortly I will file the Green Communities Act of 2007, to create energy efficient communities across the state and to streamline our Byzantine energy bureaucracy. We will take steps to reduce pollution, increase conservation, create additional sources of renewable energy, and provide support for families struggling with skyrocketing energy costs.

In addition I believe that, above all, we must be vigilant in implementing health care reform. When our historic bill was signed into law, I said we were embarking on a journey through uncharted waters. As we approach junctures that are critical to this law's success, our undivided attention and focus is needed now more than ever.

The members of this House were steadfast in supporting the foundation of our health care reform — shared responsibility. This is the idea that everyone — government, employers, individuals, providers, and insurers — all need to be pulling in the same direction. And that has been and will continue to be the key to our success.

Let me be clear: this House will not, under any circumstance, retreat from the fundamental principles that make it possible to provide quality, affordable, and accessible health care to everyone in Massachusetts.

These are only two of the many challenges we will address this session. But I must caution you, in all our work we must remember that balancing the budget for Fiscal Year 2008 will not be easy. New initiatives, expansions in current programs and additional investments — whether in education, transportation, or economic development — must be tempered by the fiscal realities of the day.
