### Remarks of Speaker DiMasi of Boston.

You should know that I am honored to be your voice on Beacon Hill. Everyday I do my best to preserve and protect the character and integrity of our neighborhoods whenever and wherever I can.

And to the most important people in my life: my family. Thank you to Debbie, Ashley, and Christian — you have graced my life with your love and support and for that I will be always grateful.

And now let us look to the future.

It is well within our ability to make the legislative session that begins today among the most productive in the history of our state. The citizens of our great Commonwealth have affirmed our record

Ladies and gentlemen, the tide has turned. Change is with us. It is a change that brings with it great promise — the type of promise that will only serve to build on our recent accomplishments.
