JOURNAL OF THE HOUSE.

Tuesday, July 22, 2014.

Met according to adjournment at eleven o'clock A.M., in an Informal Session, with Mr. Donato of Medford in the Chair (having been appointed by the Speaker, under authority conferred by Rule 5, to perform the duties of the Chair).

Pledge of allegiance.

At the request of the Chair (Mr. Donato), the members, guests and employees joined with him in reciting the pledge of allegiance to the flag.

Resolutions.

New Bedford,— Feast of Blessed Sacrament. Resolutions (filed with the Clerk by Messrs. Koczera of New Bedford, Cabral of New Bedford, Markey of Dartmouth, Schmid of Westport and Straus of Mattapoisett) congratulating the Club Madeirense S.S. Sacramento on the one hundredth celebration of the Feast of Blessed Sacrament in the city of New Bedford, were referred, under Rule 85, to the committee on Rules.

Mr. Binienda of Worcester, for said committee, reported that the resolutions ought to be adopted. Under suspension of the rules on motion of Mr. Kafka of Stoughton, the resolutions (reported by the committee on Bills in the Third Reading to be correctly drawn) were considered forthwith; and they were adopted.

Special Report.

Unemployment Trust Fund. A monthly report of the Executive Office of Labor and Workforce Development (under the provisions of Section 14F of Chapter 151A of the General Laws) relative to the condition of the Commonwealth's Unemployment Insurance Trust Fund through May, 2014, was placed on file.

Petitions.

Petitions severally were presented and referred as follows:

Lynn, municipal salaries. By Representative Fennell of Lynn and Senator McGee, a joint petition (accompanied by bill, House, No. 4335) of Robert F. Fennell and others (with the approval of the mayor and city council) that the city of Lynn be authorized to adjust the salaries of the mayor, city councillors and school committee members of said city; and

Barnstable, private roads. By Messrs. Mannal of Barnstable and Turner of Dennis, a petition (accompanied by bill, House, No. 4336) of Brian R. Mannal and Cleon H. Turner (by vote of the town council) relative the maintenance of private roads in the city known as the town of Barnstable;

Severally to the committee on Municipalities and Regional Government. Severally sent to the Senate for concurrence.

Boston, land. Mr. Rushing of Boston presented a petition (subject to Joint Rule 12) of Byron Rushing for legislation to authorize the transfer of a certain parcel of land from the Department of Conservation and Recreation to the Boston Redevelopment Authority and the city of Boston; and the same was referred, under Rule 24, to the committee on Rules.

Papers from the Senate.

The House Bill relative to the reduction of gun violence (House, No. 4285), came from the Senate passed to be engrossed, in concurrence, with an amendment striking out all after the enacting clause and inserting in place thereof the text contained in Senate document numbered 2284.

Gun violence.

Under suspension of Rule 35, on motion of Mr. Mariano of Quincy, the amendment was considered forthwith. The House then non-concurred with the Senate in its amendment; and, on further motion of the same member, asked for a committee of conference on the disagreeing votes of the two branches. Representatives Mariano, Bradley of Hingham and Peterson of Grafton were appointed the committee on the part of the House. Sent to the Senate to be joined.

Subsequently notice was received from the Senate that said branch had insisted on its amendment, concurred with the House in the appointment of a committee of conference; and that Senators Timilty, Petruccelli and Tarr had been appointed the committee on the part of the Senate.

A Bill authorizing the transfer of certain parcels of land in the town of Hubbardston (Senate, No. 2288) (on Senate, No. 2069), passed to be engrossed by the Senate, was read; and it was referred, under Rule 33, to the committee on Ways and Means.

A separate vote was taken, as required by the provisions of Article XLVIII (as amended by Article LXVII) of the Amendments to the Constitution; and the preamble was adopted, by a vote of 4 to 0. Sent to the Senate for concurrence.
