A message from His Excellency the Governor recommending legislation relative to making appropriations for the fiscal year 2013 to provide for supplementing certain existing appropriations and for certain other activities and projects (House, No. 3611), was filed in the office of the Clerk on Thursday, August 1.

The message was read; and it was referred, under Rule 30, with the accompanying draft of a bill, to the committee on Ways and Means.

Referred, under Rule 7A, to the committee on Steering, Policy and Scheduling.

The House Bill authorizing the town of Weston to grant a single license for the sale of wines and malt beverages at food stores (House, No. 3484), was read a third time.

Third reading bill amended.

The committee on Bills in the Third Reading reported recommending that the bill be amended by substitution of a bill with the same title (House, No. 3610), which was read.

The amendment was adopted; and the substituted bill was passed to be engrossed. Sent to the Senate for concurrence.
