A message from His Excellency the Governor (under Section 8 of Reading,-Article LXXXIX of the Amendments to the Constitution) recommending legislation relative to validating the results of the annual town meeting of the town of Reading held on April 22, 2013 (House, No. 3629), was filed in the office of the Clerk on Thursday, August 15.

The message was read; and it was referred, under Rule 30, with the accompanying draft of a bill, to the committee on Election Laws. Sent to the Senate for concurrence.

Resolutions.

Resolutions (filed with the Clerk by Ms. Malia of Boston) in honor Non-Violence of Non-Violence Day, August 22, 2013, were referred, under Rule 85, to the committee on Rules.

Mr. Binienda of Worcester, for said committee on Rules, reported that the resolutions ought to be adopted. Under suspension of the rules, on motion of Mr. Smizik of Brookline, the resolutions (reported by the committee on Bills in the Third Reading to be correctly drawn) were considered forthwith; and they were adopted.

Petitions.

Mr. Turner of Dennis presented a petition (accompanied by bill, House, No. 3630) of Cleon H. Turner (by vote of the town) relative to the Barrier Beach Protection Stabilization Fund in the town of Dennis; and the same was referred to the committee on Municipalities and Regional Government. Sent to the Senate for concurrence.

Messrs. Vega of Holyoke and Mahoney of Worcester presented a petition (subject to Joint Rule 12) of Aaron Vega, John J. Mahoney and others for legislation to establish post-employment sick leave banks; and the same was referred, under Rule 24, to the committee on Rules.

Papers from the Senate.

A Bill establishing a sick leave bank for Jonathan Palermo, an employee of the Trial Court (Senate, No. 1782, amended in line 1 by striking out the following: "SECTION 1.", in said line by striking out the words ", or rule or regulation", in line 3 by striking out the words ", Essex County" and inserting in place thereof the words "in the department of the trial court"; and in the title by striking out the word "Massachusetts") (on a petition), passed to be engrossed by the Senate, was read; and it was referred, under Rule 7A, to the committee on Steering, Policy and Scheduling.

Mr. Kafka of Stoughton, for said committee, reported, that the matter be scheduled for consideration by the House.

Under suspension of the rules, on motion of the same member, the bill was read a second time forthwith; and it was ordered to a third reading.

A Bill establishing the Scusset Beach Reservation trust fund and imposing a surcharge on certain fees charged for the use of Scusset Beach (Senate, No. 1395) (on a petition), passed to be engrossed by the Senate, was read; and it was referred, under Rule 33, to the committee on Ways and Means.

A petition (accompanied by bill, Senate, No. 1851) of Michael J. Rodrigues, Paul A. Schmid, III and Alan Silvia (with the approval of the mayor and city council) for legislation to authorize the city of Fall River to use certain park land for combined sewer overflow control, was referred, in concurrence, to the committee on Municipalities and Regional Government.

A petition of Michael O. Moore and Paul K. Frost for legislation to establish a sick leave bank for Jeanette Cruz, an employee of the Department of Unemployment Assistance, came from the Senate referred, under suspension of Joint Rule 12, to the committee on Public Service.

The House then concurred with the Senate in the suspension of said rule; and the petition (accompanied by bill, Senate, No. 1852) was referred, in concurrence, to the committee on Public Service.

Reports of Committees.

By Mr. Binienda of Worcester, for the committee on Rules and the committees on Rules of the two branches, acting concurrently, that Joint Rule 12 be suspended on the petition of Elizabeth A. Poirier and others for legislation to establish a sick leave bank for Donna Salois, an employee of the Wrentham Development Center. Under suspension of the rules, on motion of Mr. Cabral of New Bedford, the report was considered forthwith. Joint Rule 12 was suspended; and the petition (accompanied by bill) was referred to the committee on Public Service. Sent to the Senate for concurrence.

By Ms. Gobi of Spencer, for the committee on Environment, Natural 1 Resources and Agriculture, on a petition, a Bill relative to the milk producer's security fund reimbursement (House, No. 751).

By the same member, for the same committee, on a petition, a Bill relative to licenses issued by the Division of Marine Fisheries (House, No. 817).

Severally read; and referred, under Rule 33, to the committee on Ways and Means.

By Ms. Gobi of Spencer, for the committee on Environment, Natural Resources and Agriculture, on a petition, a Bill relative to shellfish reporting (House, No. 776). Read; and referred, under Rule 7A, to the committee on Steering, Policy and Scheduling.

By Mr. Binienda of Worcester, for the committees on Rules of the two branches, acting concurrently, that the Resolve relative to protecting the archaeological, geological and fossil resources of western Massachusetts (House, No. 744), ought to pass. Referred, under Rule 33, to the committee on Ways and Means.

Emergency Measure.

The engrossed Bill establishing a sick leave bank for Dwight Melvin Seams, an employee of the Trial Court (see House, No. 3599), having been certified by the Clerk to be rightly and truly prepared for final passage, was considered, the question being on adopting the emergency preamble.

A separate vote was taken, as required by the provisions of Article XLVIII (as amended by Article LXVII) of the Amendments to the Constitution; and the preamble was adopted, by a vote of 5 to 0. Sent to the Senate for concurrence.

Subsequently, the Senate having concurred in adoption of the emergency preamble, the bill (which originated in the House) was passed to be enacted; and it was signed by the acting Speaker and sent to the Senate.
