Thursday, November 21, 2013.

A Bill to restore the minimum wage (Senate, No. 1925, amended in section 4, in line 16, by striking out the words "and announced" and inserting in place thereof the words ", announced and posted on the department's website", in said line, by striking out the word "April" and inserting in place thereof the word "October" and, in line 17, by striking out the word "July" and inserting in place thereof the word "January"; by inserting after section 5 the following section:

Minimum

"SECTION 5A. Section 7 of said chapter 151, as so appearing, is hereby amended by striking out, in lines 30 and 31, the following words 'the cash wage required to be paid such an employee on July 1, 1999' and inserting in place thereof the following words:— 50 per cent of the minimum wage, established under section 1."; in section 6, in line 21, by striking out the following: "and 5" and inserting in place thereof the following: ", 5 and 5A" and in said line by striking out the word "January" and inserting in place thereof the word "July"; in section 7, in line 22 and also in section 8, in line 23, by striking out the word "January" and inserting in place thereof, in each instance, the word "July"; and by striking out the emergency preamble and inserting in place thereof the following emergency preamble:

"Whereas, The deferred operation of this act would tend to defeat its purpose, which is to strengthen forthwith the commonwealth's minimum wage, therefore it is hereby declared to be an emergency law, necessary for the immediate preservation of the public convenience.") (reported from the Senate committee on Ways and Means pursuant to Senate Rule 19), passed to be engrossed by the Senate, was read; and it was referred, under Rule 33, to the committee on Ways and Means.

The Senate Bill establishing a sick leave bank for Cynthia Bouchard White, an employee of the Trial Court (Senate, No. 1937) (on Senate bill No. 1915), passed to be engrossed by the Senate, was read; and it was referred, under Rule 7A, to the committee on Steering, Policy and Scheduling.

A report of the committee on Consumer Protection and Professional Licensure, asking to be discharged from further consideration of the petition (accompanied by bill, Senate, No. 150) of Bruce E. Tarr for legislation to recognize the independence of franchise operators,— and recommending the same be referred to the committee on Labor and Workforce Development,— accepted by the Senate, was considered forthwith, under Rule 42; and it was accepted, in concurrence.

Emergency Measure.

The engrossed Bill authorizing the secretary of the Massachusetts Department of Transportation to convey and acquire certain parcels of land in the city of Beverly (see Senate, No. 1901), having been certified by the Clerk to be rightly and truly prepared for final passage, was considered, the question being on adopting the emergency preamble.

Beverly, land.

A separate vote was taken, as required by the provisions of Article XLVIII (as amended by Article LXVII) of the Amendments to the Constitution; and the preamble was adopted, by a vote of 5 to 0. Sent to the Senate for concurrence.

Subsequently, the Senate having concurred in adoption of the emergency preamble, the bill (which originated in the Senate) was passed to be enacted; and it was signed by the acting Speaker and sent to the Senate.

The House Bill adding motorcycle support to the Governor's Highway Safety Committee (House, No. 3046), reported by the committee on Bills in the Third Reading to be correctly drawn, was read a third time, under suspension of Rule 47, on motion of Mr. Kafka of Stoughton.

The committee on Bills in the Third Reading reported recommending that the bill be amended by substitution of a Bill relative to membership in the Governor's Highway Safety Committee (House, No. 3787); and the report was accepted.

The amendment was adopted; and the substituted bill was passed to be engrossed. Sent to the Senate for concurrence.
