The House Bill establishing a sick leave bank for Steven Goler, an employee of the Massachusetts Department of Transportation (House, No. 3205), came from the Senate passed to be engrossed, in concurrence, with an amendment in the emergency preamble striking out the word "health" and inserting in place thereof the word "convenience". The amendment was referred, under Rule 35, to the committee on Bills in the Third Reading.

Said committee then reported that the amendment was correctly drawn; and it was adopted, in concurrence.

The House Bill establishing a sick leave bank for Vickie Myers, an employee of the Department of Correction (House, No. 51), came from the Senate passed to be engrossed, in concurrence, with amendments striking out all after the enacting clause and inserting in place thereof the text of Senate document numbered 1925, inserting before the enacting clause the following emergency preamble:

"Whereas, The deferred operation of this act would tend to defeat its purpose, which is to establish forthwith a sick leave bank for a certain employee of the trial court, therefore it is hereby declared to be an emergency law, necessary for the immediate preservation of the public convenience."; and striking out the title and inserting in place thereof the following title: "An Act establishing a sick leave bank for Vickie Myers, an employee of the Trial Court."

The amendments were referred, under Rule 35, to the committee on Bills in the Third Reading.

Emergency Measures.

Lisa

The engrossed Bill establishing a sick leave bank for Lisa Renaud, an employee of the Department of Correction (see House, No. 2281, amended), having been certified by the Clerk to be rightly and truly prepared for final passage, was considered, the question being on adopting the emergency preamble.

A separate vote was taken, as required by the provisions of Article XLVIII (as amended by Article LXVII) of the Amendments to the

Constitution; and the preamble was adopted, by a vote of 7 to 0. Sent to the Senate for concurrence.

Subsequently, the Senate having concurred in adoption of the emergency preamble, the bill (which originated in the House) was passed to be enacted; and it was signed by the acting Speaker and sent to the Senate. Bill enacted.

The engrossed Bill establishing a sick leave bank for Ignacio Farias, an employee of the Massachusetts Department of Transportation (see House, No. 3338), having been certified by the Clerk to be rightly and truly prepared for final passage, was considered, the question being on adopting the emergency preamble. A separate vote was taken, as required by the provisions of Article XLVIII (as amended by Article LXVII) of the Amendments to the Constitution; and the preamble was adopted, by a vote of 7 to 0. Sent to the Senate for concurrence.

Subsequently, the Senate having concurred in adoption of the emergency preamble, the bill (which originated in the House) was passed to be enacted; and it was signed by the acting Speaker and sent to the Senate. Bill enacted.

The committee on Bills in the Third Reading reported recommending that the House concur with the Senate in its amendments with a further amendment by striking out the following: “by striking out, in line 6, the words ‘extended illness’ and inserting in place thereof the words:— ‘department of the state auditor’s catastrophic illness or injury’;”. The report was accepted; and the further amendment was adopted.

The House then concurred with the Senate in its amendments, as amended. Sent to the Senate for concurrence in the further amendment.

Doucette, an employee of the Department of Correction (House, No. 3358) (its title having been changed by the committee on Bills in the Third Reading), reported by said committee to be correctly drawn, was read a third time; and it was passed to be engrossed.
