### Monday, August 17, 2015.

Met according to adjournment at eleven o'clock A.M., in an Informal Session, with Mr. Donato of Medford in the Chair (having been appointed by the Speaker, under authority conferred by Rule 5, to perform the duties of the Chair).

At the request of the Chair (Mr. Donato), the members, guests Pledge of and employees joined with him in reciting the pledge of allegiance allegiance. to the flag.

#### Resolutions.

The following resolutions (filed with the Clerk) were referred, under Rule 85, to the committee on Rules:

Resolutions (filed by Ms. Hogan of Stow) commending the Stow Minuteman Company on the occasion of its fiftieth anniversary;

Resolutions (filed by Mr. McKenna of Webster) congratulating Sister Constance Bayeur S.S.A. on her retirement from the Sisters of Saint Anne;

Resolutions (filed by Mr. Moran of Lawrence and other members of the House) memorializing Congress to enact legislation that would facilitate and increase the availability of headstones and grave markers to appropriately honor all deceased veterans; and

Resolutions (filed by Ms. Story of Amherst) congratulating Richard "Dick" Stein on his ninetieth birthday;

Mr. Galvin of Canton, for the committee on Rules, reported, that the resolutions ought to be adopted. Under suspension of the rules, on motion of Ms. Provost of Somerville, the resolutions (reported by the committee on Bills in the Third Reading to be correctly drawn) were considered forthwith; and they were adopted.

# Reports of Committees.

By Mr. Galvin of Canton, for the committee on Rules and the committees on Rules of the two branches, acting concurrently, that Joint Rule 12 be suspended on the following petitions:

Petition (accompanied by bill) of Stephen L. DiNatale and others relative to the state assessment system for regional charter schools. To the committee on Education.

Petition (accompanied by bill) of Stephen L. DiNatale relative to the inspections of exercise equipment in health clubs. To the committee on Public Health.

Under suspension of the rules, on motion of Ms. Provost of Somerville, the reports were considered forthwith. Joint Rule 12 then was suspended, in each instance. Severally sent to the Senate for concurrence.

## Emergency Measure.

The engrossed Bill establishing a sick leave bank for Michela T. Paone-Stuart, an employee of the Department of Correction (see House, No. 3609), having been certified by the Clerk to be rightly and truly prepared for final passage, was considered, the question being on adopting the emergency preamble.

A separate vote was taken, as required by the provisions of Article XLVIII (as amended by Article LXVII) of the Amendments to the Constitution; and the preamble was adopted, by a vote of 5 to 0. Sent to the Senate for concurrence.

Subsequently, the Senate having concurred in adoption of the emergency preamble, the bill (which originated in the House) was passed to be enacted; and it was signed by the acting Speaker and sent to the Senate.

## Engrossed Bill.

The engrossed Bill authorizing the town of Manchester-by-the-Sea to make permanent improvements to private ways and assess betterments (see Senate, No. 1939) (which originated in the Senate), having been certified by the Clerk to be rightly and truly prepared for final passage, was passed to be enacted; and it was signed by the acting Speaker and sent to the Senate.

### Orders of the Day.

The Senate Bill establishing a sick leave bank for Robert McMahan, an employee of the Department of Public Health (Senate, No. 1951, amended), reported by the committee on Bills in the Third Reading to be correctly drawn, was read a third time; and it was passed to be engrossed, in concurrence.

The amendment was adopted; and the substituted bill was passed to be engrossed. Sent to the Senate for concurrence.
