# JOURNAL OF THE HOUSE.

Monday, March 27, 2017.

Met according to adjournment at eleven o'clock A.M., in an Informal Session, with Mr. Donato of Medford in the Chair (having been appointed by the Speaker, under authority conferred by Rule 5, to perform the duties of the Chair).

Prayer was offered by Father Rick Walsh of the Paulist Center of Boston, Chaplain of the House, as follows:

God of Peace, God of Understanding, we pray for the membership of our House of Representatives and for their staff. We are mindful that tomorrow marks the anniversary of the death of the first American citizen in what later became known as World War I.

Leon Thrasher, of the town of Hardwick, was a 31-year-old mining engineer who was on his way to work in what was then called the Gold Coast in British West Africa (today's nation of Ghana). Thrasher drowned along with 104 other souls when a German submarine torpedoed the cargo-passenger ship Falaba on March 28, 1915. Months later, his body washed ashore the coast of Ireland and he was at first thought to be one of the victims of the more-recent sinking of the passenger ship Lusitania.

We are mindful today of the many citizens of our Commonwealth who are currently residing overseas, either serving our country in the military or other governmental capacity or employed by private enter-prise. May God keep them safe from all harm. And may God continue to bless our Commonwealth

From the Honorable David Paul Linsky, Chairman of the House committee on Post Audit and Oversight, submitting a report of the House committee on Post Audit and Oversight of the 189th General Court (under the provisions of Section 63 of Chapter 3 of the General Laws) entitled: Under the Radar: Massachusetts' Private Gun Sale Loophole (House, No. 3453); and

From the Office of the State Auditor (see Chapter 224 of the Acts Health care of 2012) providing a status report on a comprehensive review being conducted by said office of the impact on the health care payment and delivery system and on the health care workforce, consumers, and the general public; Severally were placed on file.

Petitions severally were presented and referred as follows: By Representative Cantwell of Marshfield and Senator O'Connor, a joint petition (subject to Joint Rule 12) of James M. Cantwell, Patrick M. O'Connor and others relative to civil liability for improper flood hazard determinations.

By Mr. Finn of West Springfield, a petition (subject to Joint Rule 12) of Michael J. Finn relative to using driving history as a rating or underwriting factor for private passenger motor vehicle insurance.

#### Paper from the Senate.

A Bill establishing a sick leave bank for Gary Kellenberger, an employee of the Department of Mental Health (Senate, No. 2043) (on Senate bill No. 1414), passed to be engrossed by the Senate, was read; and it was referred, under Rule 7A, to the committee on Steering, Policy and Scheduling.

### Report of a Committee.

By Mr. Parisella of Beverly, for the committee on Public Service, Marie on a petition, a Bill creating a sick leave bank for Marie Visco (House, No. 3450). Read; and referred, under Rule 7A, to the committee on Steering, Policy and Scheduling.

Emergency Measure.

The engrossed Bill establishing a sick leave bank for Robin Ouel-Robin Ouelland of the Department of Mental Health (see House, sick leave. lette, an employee of the Department of Mental Health (see House, No. 2776, amended), having been certified by the Clerk to be rightly and truly prepared for final passage, was considered, the question being on adopting the emergency preamble.

A separate vote was taken, as required by the provisions of Article XLVIII (as amended by Article LXVII) of the Amendments to the Constitution; and the preamble was adopted, by a vote of 4 to 0. Sent to the Senate for concurrence.

Subsequently, the Senate having concurred in adoption of the emergency preamble, the bill (which originated in the House) was passed to be enacted; and it was signed by the acting Speaker and sent to the Senate.
