The House Bill establishing a sick leave bank for Lucy A. Martinez, an employee of the Trial Court (House, No. 965), reported by the committee on Bills in the Third Reading to be correctly drawn, was read a third time; and it was passed to be engrossed. Sent to the Senate for concurrence.

Recess.

At nine minutes after eleven o'clock A.M., on motion of Mr. D'Emilia of Bridgewater (Mr. Donato of Medford being in the Chair), the House recessed until the hour of three o'clock P.M.; and at seventeen minutes after three o'clock P.M. the House was called to order with Mr. Donato in the Chair.

Reports of Committees.

Prior to the recess, Mr. Dempsey of Haverhill, for the committee on Ways and Means, that the Bill relative to financing improvements to municipal roads and bridges (House, No. 2783), ought to pass with an amendment by inserting before the enacting clause the following emergency preamble:

gency preamble: *"Whereas*, The deferred operation of this act would tend to defeat its purpose, which is to finance forthwith improvements to the commonwealth's transportation system, therefore it is hereby declared to be an emergency law, necessary for the immediate preservation of the public convenience.".

Referred, under Rule 7A, to the committee on Steering, Policy and Scheduling, with the amendment previously recommended by the committee on Bonding, Capital Expenditures and State Assets,— to amend the bill in section 2, in lines 14 and 15, by striking out the following: ", which shall be provided by the department to the city or town not later than April 1 of each year",— and the amendment recommended by the committee on Ways and Means, pending.

Mr. Murphy of Weymouth, for the committee on Steering, Policy and Scheduling, then reported that the matter be scheduled for consideration by the House.

Under suspension of Rule 7A, on motion of Mr. Dempsey of Haverhill, the bill was read a second time forthwith.

The amendment previously recommended by the committee on Bonding, Capital Expenditures and State Assets was adopted.

The amendment recommended by the committee on Ways and Means then also was adopted; and the bill, as amended, was ordered to a third reading.

Subsequently, the noon recess having terminated, under suspension of the rules, on motion of Mr. Straus of Mattapoisett, the bill (having been reported by the committee on Bills in the Third Reading to be correctly drawn) was read a third time.

After remarks on the question on passing the bill, as amended, to be engrossed, Mr. Howitt of Seekonk moved to amend it by adding the following section:

"SECTION 5. Notwithstanding any general or special law to the contrary, the Massachusetts Department of Transportation shall amend the project guidelines relating to road building equipment classifications for chapter 90 work, by reducing the minimum weight requirement for trucks, from 27 thousand pounds to 16 thousand pounds.".

The amendment was adopted.

Mr. Scibak of South Hadley then moved to amend the bill by inserting after section 4 the following section: "SECTION 6. The County Bridge spanning the Connecticut River,

"SECTION 6. The County Bridge spanning the Connecticut River, connecting South Hadley and the city of Holyoke, Bridge No. H-21-001, shall be designated and known as the Vietnam Veterans Memorial Bridge in honor and recognition of all the men and women who served their country in the Vietnam War. The Massachusetts Department of Transportation shall erect and maintain suitable markers bearing the designation in compliance with the standards of the department."

The amendment was adopted.

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Municipal roads and bridges.

Mr. Dempsey of Haverhill then moved to amend the bill in section 2, in item 6122-1720, in line 9, by inserting after the word "For", the words "grants to municipalities for"; and In item 6122-1720, in line 14, by inserting after the word "amount" the following: ", which shall be provided by the department to the city or town not later than April 15 of each year"; In section 3, in lines 36, 37 and 38, by striking out the sentence con-tained in those lines, and, in line 36, by inserting after the word "Con-stitution", the following: "; provided, however, that all such bonds shall be payable not later than June 30, 2052"; In section 4, in lines 48, 49 and 50, by striking out the sentence con-

shall be payable not later than June 30, 2052'; In section 4, in lines 48, 49 and 50, by striking out the sentence con-tained in those lines, and, in line 48, by inserting after the word "Con-stitution", the following: "; provided, however, that all such bonds shall be payable not later than June 30, 2032"; and In the emergency preamble (inserted by amendment) by striking out the words "finance forthwith" and by inserting in place thereof the words "forthwith linence"

The amendments were adopted.

Informal Session.

On the question on passing the bill, as amended, to be engrossed, the sense of the House was taken by yeas and nays, at the request of Mr. Straus of Mattapoisett; and on the roll call 154 members voted in the affirmative and $\hat{0}$ in the negative.
