

## JOURNAL OF THE HOUSE.

Thursday, May 11, 2017.

Met according to adjournment at eleven o'clock A.M., in an Informal Session, with Mr. Donato of Medford in the Chair (having been appointed by the Speaker, under authority conferred by Rule 5, to perform the duties of the Chair).

Prayer was offered by Father Rick Walsh of the Paulist Center of Boston, Chaplain of the House, as follows:

Under suspension of Rule 7A, in each instance, on motion of Ms. Barber of Somerville, the bills severally were read a second time forthwith; and they were ordered to a third reading.

By Mr. Kocot of Northampton, for the committee on State Administration and Regulatory Oversight, on a petition, a Resolve providing for the creation of a special commission relative to the seal and motto of the Commonwealth (House, No. 1707). Read; and referred, under Joint Rule 29, to the committees on Rules of the two branches, acting concurrently. State seal and motto.

Procurement,— notification.— By the same member, for the same committee, on House, No. 16 and on a part of House, No. 11, a Bill relative to Chapter 30B notification (House, No. 16).

Severally read; and referred, under Rule 33, to the committee on Ways and Means.

Minutemen and Militia day.— By Mr. Kocot of Northampton, for the committee on State Administration and Regulatory Oversight, on House, Nos. 1691 and 1692, a Bill declaring the third Saturday of the month of October as Massachusetts Minutemen and Militia Day (House, No. 1691, changed in line 6 by inserting after the word “all” the word “Massachusetts”).

Seatbelt month.— By the same member, for the same committee, on a petition, a Bill designating the month of June as seatbelt awareness month (House, No. 1716).

Governor’s Office,— plaques.— By the same member, for the same committee, on a petition, a Resolve relative to the commemoration of Governor James and General John Sullivan (House, No. 2676).

Honor and Remember flag.— By the same member, for the same committee, on a petition, a Bill relative to recognition of the “Honor and Remember” flag in the Commonwealth (House, No. 2680).

Asian American Pacific Islander month.— By the same member, for the same committee, on a petition, a Bill designating May as Asian American Pacific Islander month (House, No. 3360).

Severally read; and referred, under Rule 7A, to the committee on Steering, Policy and Scheduling.

*Emergency Measures.*

Gary Kellenberger,— sick leave.— The engrossed Bill establishing a sick leave bank for Gary Kellenberger, an employee of the Department of Mental Health (see Senate, No. 2043), having been certified by the Clerk to be rightly and truly prepared for final passage, was considered, the question being on adopting the emergency preamble.

A separate vote was taken, as required by the provisions of Article XLVIII (as amended by Article LXVII) of the Amendments to the Constitution; and the preamble was adopted, by a vote of 3 to 0. Sent to the Senate for concurrence.

Bill enacted.— Subsequently, the Senate having concurred in adoption of the emergency preamble, the bill (which originated in the Senate) was passed to be enacted; and it was signed by the acting Speaker and sent to the Senate.

The engrossed Bill establishing a sick leave bank for Ramona Foster, an employee of the Department of Elementary and Secondary Education (see Senate, No. 2054), having been certified by the Clerk to be rightly and truly prepared for final passage, was considered, the question being on adopting the emergency preamble.

Ramona Foster,— sick leave.

A separate vote was taken, as required by the provisions of Article XLVIII (as amended by Article LXVII) of the Amendments to the Constitution; and the preamble was adopted, by a vote of 4 to 0. Sent to the Senate for concurrence.

Subsequently, the Senate having concurred in adoption of the emergency preamble, the bill (which originated in the Senate) was passed to be enacted; and it was signed by the acting Speaker and sent to the Senate.

Bill enacted.

*Engrossed Bill.*

The engrossed Bill establishing a sick leave bank for Gail Normandin, an employee of the Executive Office of Labor and Workforce Development (Senate, No. 2059) (which originated in the Senate), in respect to which the Senate had concurred in adoption of the emergency preamble, was passed to be enacted; and it was signed by the acting Speaker and sent to the Senate.

Bill enacted.

The House Bill authorizing the city of Lowell to use land at 512 Clark Road and 512.1 Clark Road, which includes land extending into Tewksbury and is currently athletic fields and public space, and land at 438 Douglas Road and portions of 424 Douglas Road and 492 Douglas Road, which is currently a parking lot for Cawley Stadium, for the construction of a new public high school and school related purposes thereto (House, No. 3654, changed), was read a second time; and it was ordered to a third reading.
