Monday, June 19, 2017.

Met at according to adjournment eleven o'clock A.M., in an Informal Session, with Mr. Donato of Medford in the Chair (having been appointed by the Speaker, under authority conferred by Rule 5, to perform the duties of the Chair).

Message from the Governor.

A message from His Excellency the Governor recommending legislation to provide continuing investment in the life sciences industry in the Commonwealth (House, No. 3770), was filed this day in the office of the Clerk. Life sciences,—

The message was read; and it was referred, under Rule 30, with the accompanying draft of a bill, to the committee on Economic Development and Emerging Technologies. Sent to the Senate for concurrence.

Guests of the House.

At the beginning of the session, the Chair (Mr. Donato of Medford), declared a brief recess and introduced, seated in the Chamber, students from the Baker School in Brookline. Resolutions.

The following resolutions (filed with the Clerk) were referred, under Rule 85, to the committee on Rules:

Marilyn Frank. Resolutions (filed by Mr. Arciero) congratulating Marilyn Frank of Westford on her selection as the 2017 Westford Unsung Heroine by the Massachusetts Commission on the Status of Women; and

Truro Meeting House. Resolutions (filed by Ms. Peake of Provincetown) commending the Friends of the Truro Meeting House on the preservation of the Truro Meeting House;

Mr. Galvin of Canton, for the committee on Rules, reported, in each instance, that the resolutions ought to be adopted. Under suspension of the rules, in each instance, on motion of Mr. Sánchez of Boston, the resolutions (reported by the committee on Bills in the Third Reading to be correctly drawn) were considered forthwith; and they were adopted.

Communication.

Public utilities,—self-generation. A communication from the Department of Public Utilities (see Section 1G of Chapter 164 of the General Laws) submitting its annual report concerning self-generation for fiscal year 2016, was placed on file.

Petitions.

Petitions severally were presented and referred as follows:

Milford,—liquor license. By Mr. Murray of Milford, a petition (accompanied by bill, House, No. 3762) of Brian Murray and Ryan C. Fattman (by vote of the town) that the town of Milford be authorized to grant an additional license for the sale of all alcoholic beverages to be drunk on the premises; and

Danvers,—liquor licenses. By Representative Speliotis of Danvers and Senator Lovely, a joint petition (accompanied by bill, House, No. 3763) of Theodore C. Speliotis and Joan B. Lovely (by vote of the town) that the town of Danvers be authorized to grant ten additional licenses for the sale of alcoholic beverages to be drunk on the premises;

Severally to the committee on Consumer Protection and Professional Licensure.

Milford,—town meeting. By Mr. Murray of Milford, a petition (accompanied by bill, House, No. 3764) of Brian Murray and Ryan C. Fattman (by vote of the town) that the town of Milford be authorized to add the positions of town administrator and finance director as town meeting members. To the committee on Municipalities and Regional Government.

Severally sent to the Senate for concurrence.

Papers from the Senate.

Drunk drivers,—recidivism. A message from His Excellency the Governor recommending legislation relative to protecting the Commonwealth from recidivist drunk drivers (Senate, No. 2087) was referred, in concurrence, to the committee on the Judiciary

Reports

Of the committee on Consumer Protection and Professional Licensure, asking to be discharged from further consideration:

Of the petition (accompanied by bill, Senate, No. 116) of James B. Eldridge, Robert M. Koczera and James Arciero for legislation to protect the privacy of consumer financial information; and

Consumer information,—privacy.

Of the petition (accompanied by bill, Senate, No. 120) of James B. Eldridge, Paul Brodeur, Denise Provost, Jay R. Kaufman and other members of the General Court for legislation relative to fairness in debt collection;

Debt collections.

And recommending that the same severally be referred to the committee on Financial Services;

Severally accepted by the Senate, were considered forthwith, under Rule 42; and they were accepted, in concurrence.

A petition (accompanied by bill) of Michael O. Moore for legislation to exempt residents of the Commonwealth from payment of tuition or mandatory curriculum fees at community colleges, came from the Senate referred, under suspension of Joint Rule 12, to the committee on Higher Education.

Community colleges,—tuition and fees.

The House then concurred with the Senate in the suspension of said rule; and the petition (accompanied by bill, Senate, No. 2088) was referred, in concurrence, to the committee on Higher Education.

By Ms. Benson of Lunenburg, for the committee on Consumer Protection and Professional Licensure, on a petition, a Resolve providing for an investigation and study by a special commission relative to consumer protections with regard to cemeteries and crematories (House, No. 170). Read; and referred, under Joint Rule 29, to the committees on Rules of the two branches, acting concurrently.

By Ms. Benson of Lunenburg, for the committee on Consumer Protection and Professional Licensure, on a joint petition, a Bill to establish licensing standards for drain cleaners (House, No. 140) [Representative Howitt of Seekonk dissenting].

By the same member, for the same committee, on a petition, a Bill to increase transparency and trust in charitable solicitations (House, No. 160).

Charitable solicitations.

By the same member, for the same committee, on a petition, a Bill relative to funeral homes and charitable foundations (House, No. 164).

Charitable foundations.

By the same member, for the same committee, on a petition, a Bill relative to notifying automobile lien holders of certain towing and storage costs (House, No. 177).

Towing and storage costs.

By the same member, for the same committee, on a petition, a Bill relative to updating the plumbing code in order to accommodate agricultural uses (House, No. 181).

Plumbing code.

By the same member, for the same committee, on a petition, a Bill relative to licensure requirements for Jefe Rivera (House, No. 186).

Jefe Rivera,—licensure.

Severally read; and referred, under Rule 33, to the committee on Ways and Means.

By Ms. Benson of Lunenburg, for the committee on Consumer Protection and Professional Licensure, on a petition, a Bill relative to unsolicited credit cards, checks, and vouchers by mail (House, No. 169).

Unsolicited mail.

Residential paving.— By the same member, for the same committee, on a petition, a Bill regulating residential paving (House, No. 172).

Businesses,— location.— By the same member, for the same committee, on a petition, a Bill prohibiting intentional misrepresentation by a business of its location (House, No. 184).

Severally read; and referred, under Rule 7A, to the committee on Steering, Policy and Scheduling.

Businesses,— telemarketing.— By Ms. Benson of Lunenburg, for the committee on Consumer Protection and Professional Licensure, on a petition, a Bill allowing businesses to sign up for the “Do Not Call” list (House, No. 137).

David Senatillaka,— sick leave.— By Mr. Parisella of Beverly, for the committee on Public Service, on a petition, a Bill establishing a sick leave bank for David Senatillaka, an employee of the Department of Correction (House, No. 3734).

Severally read; and referred, under Rule 7A, to the committee on Steering, Policy and Scheduling.

Mr. Murphy of Weymouth, for said committee, then reported that the matters be scheduled for consideration by the House; and, under said rule, they were placed in the Orders of the Day for the next sitting for a second reading.

Salem,— liquor license.— By Mr. Murphy of Weymouth, for the committee on Steering, Policy and Scheduling, that the House Bill authorizing the city of Salem to grant 1 additional liquor license for the sale of wine and malt beverages not to be drunk on the premises (House, No. 3753) [Local Approval Received], be scheduled for consideration by the House; and under Rule 7A, it was placed in the Orders of the Day for the next sitting for a second reading.

Engrossed Bills.

Bill enacted.— The engrossed Bill establishing a sick leave bank for Pamela Dube, an employee of the Department of Developmental Services (see House, No. 3651, amended) (which originated in the House), in respect to which the Senate had concurred in adoption of the emergency preamble, was passed to be enacted; and it was signed by the acting Speaker and sent to the Senate.

Id.— The engrossed Bill authorizing the town of Deerfield to convey a certain parcel of land (see House bill printed in House, No. 3670, amended) (which originated in the House), having been certified by the Clerk to be rightly and truly prepared for final passage, was passed to be enacted (more than two thirds of the members having agreed to pass the same); and it was signed by the acting Speaker and sent to the Senate.

Recess.

Recess.— At ten minutes after eleven o'clock A.M., on motion of Mr. Wong of Saugus (Mr. Donato of Medford being in the Chair), the House recessed subject to the call of the Chair; and at five minutes before three o'clock P.M., the House was called to order with Mr. Donato in the Chair.

Reports of Committees.

Mr. Galvin of Canton, for the committee on Rules, reported (under the provisions of House Rules 7B and 7C) an Order relative to special procedures for consideration of the House Bill to ensure the public health and safety of patient and consumer access to medical and adult use of marijuana in the Commonwealth [House, No. 3768] (for order, see House, No. 3769). The order was considered forthwith; and it was adopted.
