JOURNAL OF THE HOUSE.

Thursday, July 20, 2017.

Met according to adjournment at eleven o'clock A.M., in an Informal Session, with Mr. Donato of Medford in the Chair (having been appointed by the Speaker, under authority conferred by Rule 5, to perform the duties of the Chair).

Prayer was offered by Father Rick Walsh of the Paulist Center of Boston, Chaplain of the House, as follows:

God of Abundance, we pray for our elected officials in this House and for their staff. We pray too for all who make this Chamber their place of employment.

God of Plenty, we remember that it was on this day back in 1801, that the town of Cheshire in Berkshire County produced a giant wheel of cheese to celebrate the U.S. Presidential election of Republican Thomas Jefferson. Cheshire was populated by farmers who opposed native son John Adams whose Federalist Party favored a more central

government and higher taxes.

Like its namesake in England, Cheshire was known for its cheese production. It was the only town in Berkshire County that voted for Jefferson. The idea for the mammoth cheese came from the local Baptist minister, John Leland, who met Jefferson when the minister lived in Virginia.

The cheese was more than four feet in diameter and 17 inches in height and weighed 1,235 pounds. The cheese was too large and delicate to be delivered by wheel and so it was brought to Washington, D.C. the following winter by sled and by barge. The Cheshire cheese is said to have lingered in the White House for over two years. A monument of the cheese press now sits in Leland Park near the town center.
