Resolutions.

Resolutions (filed with the Clerk by Representatives Gifford of Wareham and Orrall of Lakeville) celebrating the occasion of Doris Lemmo on her one hundredth birthday, were referred under Rule 85, to the committee on Rules.

Mr. Galvin of Canton, for said committee, reported that the resolutions ought to be adopted. Under suspension of the rules, on motion of Mr. Wong of Saugus, the resolutions (reported by the committee on Bills in the Third Reading to be correctly drawn) were considered forthwith; and they were adopted.

Petition

Mrs. O'Connell of Taunton presented a petition (subject to Joint Rule 12) of Shaunna L. O'Connell and others relative to access of level 1 sex offender information by the Department of Early Education and Care, pre-kindergarten schools and certain child care programs or providers; and the same was referred, under Rule 24, to the committee on Rules.

Papers from the Senate.

A message from His Excellency the Governor recommending legislation relative to updating laws relating to dangerous drugs and protect-ing witnesses (Senate, No. 2158), was referred, in concurrence, to the committee on the Judiciary.

A message from His Excellency the Governor (pursuant to Article II, Section 8 of Article LXXXIX of the Amendments to the Constitution) recommending legislation to validate certain proceedings of the town of Hull (Senate, No. 2157), was referred, in concurrence, to the committee on Municipalities and Regional Government.

Taunton, special police.

Authorizing the appointment of retired police officers as special police officers in the city of Taunton (Senate, No. 2034, amended in section 1, in lines 8 and 9, by striking out the sentence contained in those lines and inserting in place thereof the following sentence: "A retired police officer shall not be initially appointed as a special police officer under this act if that officer has been retired for more

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than 4.5 years; provided, however, that an officer who has been retired for more than 4.5 years but was appointed as a constable before the effective date of this act may be appointed as a special police officer.", in line 12 by striking out the figures: "68" and inserting in place thereof the figures: "70"; in section 2, in line 19, by striking out the following: ", chapter 150E or chapter 151A" and inserting in place thereof the following: "or chapter 150E"; and in section 4, in lines 27 and 28, by striking out the following: "upon the officer's 68th birthday" (as changed by the Senate committee on Bills in the Third Reading) and inserting in place thereof the following: "when that officer reaches the age of 70") (on a petition) [Local Approval Received]; Establishing a sick leave bank for David Lamkin, an employee of David.

"Whereas, The deferred operation of this act would tend to defeat its purpose, which is to establish forthwith a sick leave bank for a certain employee of the department of correction, therefore it is hereby declared to be an emergency law, necessary for the immediate preservation of the public convenience.")
