The new Boston Light was built on the same location in 1783 and is still in use as the nation's second oldest lighthouse.

By Mr. Fernandes of Falmouth, a petition (subject to Joint Rule 12) of Dylan Fernandes relative to the powers of cities and town to regulate,

restrict or prohibit the use, application or disposal of certain pesticides.

By Representative McMurtry of Dedham and Senator Rush, a joint petition (subject to Joint Rule 12) of Paul McMurtry and Michael F. Rush for legislation to establish a sick leave bank for Erik Nordahl, an employee of the Massachusetts Rehabilitation Commission.

By Mr. Muratore of Plymouth, a petition (subject to Joint Rule 12) of Mathew Muratore and others for legislation to authorize the treasurer of Plymouth County to transfer certain funds.

By Representative O'Day of West Boylston and Senator Chandler, a joint petition (subject to Joint Rule 12) of James J. O'Day and Harriette L. Chandler for legislation to establish a sick leave bank for Laura Sypien, an employee of the Worcester Recovery Center and Hospital. Severally, under Rule 24, to the committee on Rules.

Reports of Committees.

Homebuvers.college accounts

By Mr. Galvin of Canton, for the committee on Rules and the committees on Rules of the two branches, acting concurrently, that Joint Rule 12 be suspended on the petition of Dylan Fernandes relative to the establishment of first-time homebuyer savings accounts and pro-viding for an income tax deduction for certain amounts contributed to such accounts. Under suspension of the rules, on motion of Ms. Barber of Somerville, the report was considered forthwith. Joint Rule 12 was

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suspended; and the petition (accompanied by bill) was referred to the committee on Revenue. Sent to the Senate for concurrence.

By Mr. Murphy of Weymouth, for the committee on Steering, Policy and Scheduling, that the House Bill dissolving the redevelopment authority in the town of Ashland (House, No. 3875) [Local Approval Received], be scheduled for consideration by the House.

Under suspension of Rule 7A, on motion of Mr. McGonagle of Everett, the bill was read a second time forthwith; and it was ordered to a third reading.

By Mr. O'Day of West Boylston, for the committee on Municipalities Somerville,and Regional Government, on a petition, a Bill relative to authorizing the city of Somerville to impose impact fees for any development project for the purposes of funding the Green Line extension (House, No. 3882) [Local Approval Received]. Read; and referred, under Rule 7A, to the committee on Steering, Policy and Scheduling.

Engrossed Bill.

The engrossed Bill establishing a sick leave bank for Matthew Bill McGaughran, an employee of the Department of Correction (see Senate, No. 2123, amended) (which originated in the Senate), in respect to which the Senate had concurred in adoption of the emergency preamble, was passed to be enacted; and it was signed by the acting Speaker and sent to the Senate.

Orders of the Day.

The Senate Bill authorizing the appointment of special police officers in the city of Brockton (Senate, No. 2138) (its title having been changed by the committee on the Bills in the Third Reading), reported by said committee to be correctly drawn, was read a third time; and it was passed to be engrossed, in concurrence.

The House Bill authorizing the town of Whately to continue the Whately,employment of John LaSalle [sic] as a call firefighter (House, No. 3791), reported by the committee on Bills in the Third Reading to be correctly drawn, was read a third time.

Pending the question on passing the bill to be engrossed, Mr. Speliotis of Danvers moved to amend it in section 1, in line 6, by inserting after the word "purposes" the words "and upon retirement, he shall receive a superannuation retirement allowance equal to that which he would have been entitled had he retired on that date"

The amendment was adopted; and the bill (House, No. 3791, amended) was passed to be engrossed. Sent to the Senate for concurrence.
