JOURNAL OF THE HOUSE.

Monday, September 18, 2017.

Met according to adjournment at eleven o'clock A.M., in an Informal Session, with Mr. Donato of Medford in the Chair (having been appointed by the Speaker, under authority conferred by Rule 5, to perform the duties of the Chair).

Prayer was offered by Father Rick Walsh of the Paulist Center of Boston, Chaplain of the House, as follows:

We remember that it was on this day in 1634 that Anne Hutchinson arrived in Boston with her husband and 12 children. They built and settled in a house at the corner of today's School Street and Washington Street. It was during her work as a midwife that Hutchinson came to be recognized as a gifted teacher in the ways of the Christian faith as practiced by the Puritans. Soon her reputation spread and she began to attract many followers to her home, as women at that time were not

allowed to teach in public.

Her interpretations of the Puritan faith however came to be at odds with the leadership of the Massachusetts Bay Colony. After a court found her guilty of heresy, she was banned from the colony and she and a group of 70 followers took refuge for a time in the new colony of Rhode Island. In 1643, after having moved to the Dutch colony of New Amsterdam, she and all but one of her children were massacred in an attack by a native tribe there. Anne Hutchinson is recognized as the first notable woman religious leader in the American colonies.
