

JOURNAL OF THE HOUSE.

Wednesday, September 27, 2017.

Met according to adjournment at eleven o'clock A.M., with Mr. Donato of Medford in the Chair (having been appointed by the Speaker, under authority conferred by Rule 5, to perform the duties of the Chair).

Prayer was offered by Father Rick Walsh of the Paulist Center of Boston, Chaplain of the House, as follows:

Paper from the Senate.

A Bill relative to the A-B-C Stormwater Flooding Board (Senate, No. 2127, amended by inserting before the enacting clause the following emergency preamble: A-B-C Stormwater Flooding Board.

"Whereas, The deferred operation of this act would tend to defeat its purpose, which is to provide forthwith for the continuation of the environmental joint powers agreement that created the A-B-C Stormwater Flooding Board, therefore it is hereby declared to be an emergency law, necessary for the immediate preservation of the public convenience.") (on a petition), passed to be engrossed by the Senate, was read; and it was referred, under Rule 7A, to the committee on Steering, Policy and Scheduling.

Reports of Committees.

By Mr. Galvin of Canton, for the committee on Rules and the committees on Rules of the two branches, acting concurrently, that Joint Rule 12 be suspended on the petition of Thomas M. Petrolati for legislation to establish a sick leave bank for Amanda Rodrigues, an employee of the Trial Court. Under suspension of the rules, on motion of Mr. Petrolati of Ludlow, the report was considered forthwith. Joint Rule 12 then was suspended; and the petition (accompanied by bill) was referred to the committee on the Judiciary. Amanda Rodrigues,—sick leave.

By Mr. Murphy of Weymouth, for the committee on Steering, Policy and Scheduling that the Senate Bill establishing a town manager in the town of West Newbury (Senate, No. 2161) [Local Approval Received], be scheduled for consideration by the House. West Newbury,—town manager.

Seekonk,— charter. By Mr. Mahoney of Worcester, for the committee on Election Laws, on a petition, a Bill relative to establishing a charter commission (House, No. 2087) [Local Approval Received].

Westminster,— maintenance fund. By Mr. O'Day of West Boylston, for the committee on Municipalities and Regional Government, on a petition, a Bill establishing a private road maintenance revolving fund in the town of Westminster (House, No. 3905) [Local Approval Received].

Maria Williams,— sick leave. By Mr. Parisella of Beverly, for the committee on Public Service, on a joint petition, a Bill establishing a sick leave bank for Maria Williams, an employee of the Department of Mental Health (House, No. 3922).

Laura Sypien,— sick leave. By the same member, for the same committee, on a joint petition, establishing a sick leave bank for Laura Sypien, an employee of the Worcester Recovery Center and Hospital (House, No. 3923).

Severally read; and referred, under Rule 7A, to the committee on Steering, Policy and Scheduling.

Engrossed Bills.

Bills enacted. Authorizing the town of Palmer to issue an additional license for the sale of all alcoholic beverages not to be drunk on the premises (see Senate, No. 2051) (which originated in the Senate); and

Establishing the department of inspectional services and permitting in the town of Lakeville (see House, No. 2780) (which originated in the House);

Severally having been certified by the Clerk to be rightly and truly prepared for final passage, were passed to be enacted; and they were signed by the acting Speaker and sent to the Senate.

Recess. At a quarter after eleven o'clock A.M., on motion of Mr. Wong of Saugus (Mr. Donato of Medford being in the Chair), the House recessed until the hour of one o'clock P.M.; and at five minutes after one o'clock, the House was called to order with Mr. Donato in the Chair.

Engrossed Bill — Land Taking.

Cambridge,— land. The engrossed Bill authorizing the city of Cambridge to use certain land used for park, playground or recreation for other municipal purposes (see House, No. 1100, amended) (which originated in the House), having been certified by the Clerk to be rightly and truly prepared for final passage, was put upon its final passage.

Bill enacted (land taking),— yea and nay No. 146. On the question on passing the bill to be enacted, the sense of the House was taken by yeas and nays (this being a bill providing for the taking of land or other easements used for conservation purposes, etc., as defined by Article XCVII of the Amendments to the Constitution); and on the roll call 152 members voted in the affirmative and 0 in the negative.

Mr. Sánchez of Boston, for the committee on Ways and Means, on a message from His Excellency the Governor (for message, see House, No. 3828), returning with his disapproval of certain items and sections, parts of certain items, and reductions in certain items, contained in the engrossed Bill making appropriations for the fiscal year 2018 for the maintenance of the departments, board, commissions, institutions and certain activities of the Commonwealth, for interest, sinking fund and serial bond requirements and for certain permanent improvements (see House, No. 3800), reported, in part, that certain items and sections stand (as passed by the General Court). Severally referred, under Rule 7A, to the committee on Steering, Policy and Scheduling.

General Appropriation Bill.

Mr. Murphy of Weymouth, for said committee, reported, in each instance, that the matters be scheduled for consideration by the House.

There being no objection, Mr. Sánchez of Boston then moved suspension of said rule, in each instance, in order that the reports may be considered forthwith.

On suspension of Rule 7A, the sense of the House was taken by yeas and nays, at the request of Mr. Jones of North Reading; and on the roll call 118 members voted in the affirmative and 33 in the negative.

Therefore item 9110-1900 passed, notwithstanding the reductions of the Governor (more than two-thirds of the members present and voting having voted in the affirmative). Sent to the Senate for its action.

The Senate amendment of the House Bill authorizing the town of Boylston to convey a portion of a certain parcel of land (House, No. 1120), reported by the committee on Bills in the Third Reading to be correctly drawn, was adopted, in concurrence.

The House Bill relative to certain affordable housing in the East Boston section of the city of Boston (House, No. 2243), reported by the committee on Bills in the Third Reading to be correctly drawn was read a third time; and it was passed to be engrossed. Sent to the Senate for concurrence.

The House Bill supporting local business retention (House, No. 3352), reported by the committee on Bills in the Third Reading to be correctly drawn, was read a third time.

Pending the question on passing the bill to be engrossed, Messrs. Spliotis of Danvers and Donato of Medford moved to amend it by

striking out all after the enacting clause and inserting in place thereof the following:

“Section 6 of chapter 64H of the General Laws, as appearing in the 2016 Official Edition, is hereby amended by adding the following paragraph:

(yy) Sale of restaurant meals by a small business if the small business can prove a hardship caused by either a public works project or by an action taken by a municipal utility company; provided, however, that the hardship shall last for at least 1 year. Any such exemption shall expire when the hardship ends, or after no more than 2 consecutive years. The city or town that imposed a local sales tax upon the sale of restaurant meals pursuant to chapter 64L shall establish a maximum number of employees, or maximum gross receipts in the preceding calendar year, for which a small business may be eligible for this exemption. Said small business shall apply for such exemption by the 1 year anniversary of the end of the project or action causing the hardship.”

The amendment was adopted; and the bill (House, No. 3352, amended) was passed to be engrossed. Sent to the Senate for concurrence.
