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# JOURNAL OF THE HOUSE.

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Wednesday, October 4, 2017.

Met according to adjournment at eleven o'clock A.M., with Mr. Donato of Medford in the Chair (having been appointed by the Speaker, under authority conferred by Rule 5, to perform the duties of the Chair).

*Moment of Silent Tribute for the Victims of the Las Vegas Shooting.*

The Speaker being in the Chair,—

At the request of the Speaker and all members of the House, the members, guests and employees rose for a moment of silent tribute to the memory of the victims of the Las Vegas shooting. The attack claimed at least fifty-eight lives—including forty-two-year-old Rhonda LeRocque of Tewksbury—and injured more than 500 people at the Route 91 Harvest Music Festival. The House of Representatives extended its deepest condolences and prayers to the families of the victims, and to all those touched by this tragic event; and offered its highest praise to the emergency personnel and civilians who selflessly cared for victims without regard for their own wellbeing.
