Thursday, September 17, 2020.

Met according to adjournment at eleven o'clock A.M., in an Informal Session, with Mrs. Haddad of Somerset in the Chair (having been appointed by the Speaker, under authority conferred by Rule 5, to perform the duties of the Chair).

At the request of the Chair (Mrs. Haddad), the members and employees joined with her in reciting the pledge of allegiance to the flag.

Silent Prayer.

At the request of Speaker DeLeo of Winthrop and Representatives Cronin of Easton and Ciccolo of Lexington the members and employees stood in a moment of silent tribute to the memory of Supreme Judicial Court Chief Justice Ralph D. Gants. Chief Justice Gants died on September 14, 2020 at the age of 65.

Supreme Judicial Court Chief Justice Ralph D. Gants.

Ralph Gants became the Chief Justice of the Supreme Judicial Court, the oldest appellate court in the Western hemisphere, in 2014. He was a thoughtful and brilliant jurist, whose passion for justice infused the court system and reflected the groundbreaking spirit of our state.

Throughout his life, he worked to improve the lives of the residents of Massachusetts. His commitment to criminal justice reform fueled legislation on that which the House passed in 2017. In providing a glimpse of his philosophy, he once said that "each of us has an obligation to repair the world...[I]f you can save one life, it is as if you have saved the entire world. In our courts, we seek to repair the world, sometimes even save the world, one person at a time." It is that belief we will hold in our hearts as we extend our condolences to his family. Let us now take a moment to remember Chief Justice Ralph Gants.

Order.

Joint Rule 12 was suspended; and the petition (accompanied by bill) was referred to the committee on Public Service. Sent to the Senate for concurrence.

Joseph Gatto, sick leave.

Representative McMurtry of Dedham and Senator Rush presented a joint petition (subject to Joint Rule 12) of Paul McMurtry and Michael F. Rush for legislation to establish a sick leave bank for Joseph Gatto, an employee of the Suffolk County Sheriff's Department; and the same was referred, under Rule 24, to the committee on Rules.

Under suspension of the rules, on motion of Mr. Wong of Saugus, the report was considered forthwith. Joint Rule 12 was suspended; and the petition (accompanied by bill) was referred to the committee on Public Service. Sent to the Senate for concurrence.

Ms. Peisch of Wellesley presented a petition (subject to Joint Rule 12) of Alice Hanlon Peisch relative to extending vote by mail options for municipal elections; and the same was referred, under Rule 24, to the committee on Rules.

A petition (accompanied by bill) of Jonathan Green for legislation relative to the ban of menthol tobacco, came from the Senate referred, under suspension of Joint Rule 12, to the committee on Public Health.

The House then concurred with the Senate in the suspension of said rule; and the petition (accompanied by bill, Senate, No. 2911) was referred, in concurrence, to the committee on Public Health.

A report of the committee on Steering, Policy and Scheduling, under the last sentence of Rule 7A, that the Senate Bill providing for a gender-neutral charter in the town of Walpole (Senate, No. 2807) [Local Approval Received], be scheduled for consideration by the House.

Under suspension of Rule 7A, on motion of Mr. Hill of Ipswich, the bill was read a second time forthwith; and it was ordered to a third reading.

By Mr. Parisella of Beverly, for the committee on Public Service, on a joint petition, a Bill exempting certain positions of the police department of the town of Webster from the civil service law (House, No. 4955) [Local Approval Received]. Read; and referred, under Rule 7A, to the committee on Steering, Policy and Scheduling.

The engrossed Bill making technical corrective changes to the Cape Cod and Islands Water Protection Fund tax assessments (see House, No. 4073, amended) (which originated in the House), having been certified by the Clerk to be rightly and truly prepared for final passage, was passed to be enacted; and it was signed by the acting Speaker and sent to the Senate.
