Fiola for legislation to establish a sick leave bank for Emily Texeira, an employee of the Bristol County Sheriff's Office. Under suspension of the rules, on motion of Mr. Wong of Saugus, the report was considered forthwith. Joint Rule 12 was suspended; and the petition (accompanied by bill) was referred to the committee on Public Service. Sent to the Senate for concurrence.

Severally referred, under Joint Rule 29, to the committees on Rules of the two branches, acting concurrently.

Subsequently, Mr. Galvin of Canton, for said committees, reported, in each instance, asking to be discharged from further consideration of the orders; and recommending that the same severally be referred to the House committee on Rules. Under Rule 42, the reports severally were considered forthwith; and they were accepted.

By Mr. Hay of Fitchburg, for the committee on Labor and Workforce Development, on House, No. 1617, a Bill requiring one fair wage (House, No. 5085). Read; and referred, under Joint Rule 29, to the committees on Rules of the two branches, acting concurrently.

By Mr. Hay of Fitchburg, for the committee on Labor and Workforce Development, on House, Nos. 1605 and 1610, a Bill to prevent wage theft, promote employer accountability, and enhance public enforcement (House, No. 5086). Read; and referred, under Rule 33, to the committee on Ways and Means.

By Mr. Hay of Fitchburg, for the committee on Labor and Workforce Development, on a petition, a Bill for unemployment rules for gig economy (House, No. 4746). Read; and referred, under Rule 7A, to the committee on Steering, Policy and Scheduling.

Emergency Measure.

The engrossed Bill authorizing the University of Massachusetts to convey a certain parcel of land and buildings to the city of Waltham (see House, No. 4927, amended), having been certified by the Clerk to be rightly and truly prepared for final passage, was considered, the question being on adopting the emergency preamble.

Waltham,—land.

A separate vote was taken, as required by the provisions of Article XLVIII (as amended by Article LXVII) of the Amendments to the Constitution; and the preamble was adopted, by a vote of 2 to 0. Sent to the Senate for concurrence.

Engrossed Bill.

The engrossed Bill relative to the transfer and sale of a certain parcel of land in the town of Tewksbury (see Senate, No. 2384, amended) (which originated in the Senate), having been certified by the Clerk to be rightly and truly prepared for final passage, was passed to be enacted; and it was signed by the acting Speaker and sent to the Senate.

Orders of the Day.

The Senate amendments of the House Bill authorizing the commissioner of Capital Asset Management and Maintenance to convey an easement in certain land in the city of Peabody (House, No. 4219), reported by the committee on Bills in the Third Reading to be correctly drawn, were considered.

Peabody,—land.

Pending the question on adoption of the amendments, in concurrence, Mr. Speliotis of Danvers moved that the House concur with the Senate in its amendments with further amendments in section 3, subsection (b) by striking out the last sentence (inserted by amendment by the Senate) and inserting in place thereof the following sentence:

"The compensation shall be deposited in the George L. Darey Inland Fisheries and Game Fund created by section 2C of chapter 131 of the General Laws."; and in section 3 by striking out subsection (d) (inserted by amendment by the Senate) and inserting in place thereof the following subsection:

"(d) Notwithstanding sections 32 to 37 inclusive, of chapter 7C of the General Laws or any other general or special law to the contrary and as a further condition of the grant of easement authorized in this act, the commissioner of capital asset management and maintenance shall transfer to the department of fish and game 4 parcels located in the city of Peabody to be held in perpetuity for conservation purposes. The parcels were acquired for conservation purposes and are more particularly described: (1) in a deed recorded in the Southern Essex registry of deeds in book 6159, page 155 and containing 6.4 acres; (2) as parcel 3 in a deed recorded in the Southern Essex registry of deeds in book 6066, page 455 and containing 2.7 acres; (3) in a deed recorded in the Southern Essex registry of deeds in book 5935, page 65 and containing 9.37 acres; and (4) as parcel 2 in a deed recorded in the Southern Essex registry of deeds in book 6066, page 455 and containing 3.76 acres."

The further amendments were adopted.

The House then concurred with the Senate in its amendments, as amended. Sent to the Senate for concurrence in the further amendments.

The House Bill authorizing the town of Kingston to establish a special fund to process activity produced by non-town net metering (House, No. 4390), reported by the committee on Bills in the Third Reading to be correctly drawn, was read a third time.

Pending the question on passing the bill to be engrossed, Mr. Speliotis of Danvers moved to amend it by substitution of a bill with the same title (House, No. 5082), which was read.

The amendment was adopted; and the substituted bill was passed to be engrossed. Sent to the Senate for concurrence.
