MONDAY, MAY 16, 2022.

Message from the Governor—Disapproval and Recommendation of Amendment in Supplemental Appropriations Bill.

A message from His Excellency the Governor returning with his disapproval of section 73 and with an amendment to section 38 contained in the engrossed Bill making appropriations for fiscal year 2022 to provide for supplementing certain existing appropriations and for certain other activities and projects [see House, No. 4578, amended] (for message, see House, No. 4678), filed in the office of the Clerk on Friday, April 1, was read.
