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Wednesday, May 25, 2022.

Met according to adjournment at eleven o'clock A.M., in an Informal Session, with Mr. Donato of Medford in the Chair (having been appointed by the Speaker, under authority conferred by Rule 5, to perform the duties of the Chair).

At the request of the Chair (Mr. Donato), the members, guests and employees joined with him in reciting the pledge of allegiance to the flag.

Resolutions.

Resolutions (filed with the Clerk by Representatives Pignatelli of Lenox, Barrett of North Adams, Farley-Bouvier of Pittsfield and Mark of Peru) congratulating Gerard E. Burke on his retirement as President and Chief Executive Officer of Hillcrest Educational Centers, Inc., were referred under Rule 85, to the committee on Rules.

Mr. Galvin of Canton, for said committee, reported that the resolutions ought to be adopted. Under suspension of the rules, on motion of Mr. Wong of Saugus, the resolutions (reported by the committee on Bills in the Third Reading to be correctly drawn) were considered forthwith; and they were adopted.

Under suspension of the rules, on motion of Mr. Wong of Saugus, the order (Senate, No. 2865, amended) was considered forthwith; and it was adopted, in concurrence.

A Bill establishing a sick leave bank for Dr. Heidi Tarr Henson. [sic] an employee of the executive office of labor and workforce development (Senate, No. 2863) (on Senate, No. 2845), passed to be engrossed by the Senate, was read; and it was referred, under Rule 7A, to the committee on Steering, Policy and Scheduling.

Avon, liquor license.

A petition (accompanied by bill, Senate, No. 2885) of Walter F. Timilty, William C. Galvin and Michael D. Brady (by vote of the town) for legislation to authorize the town of Avon to grant one additional license for the sale of all alcoholic beverages not to be drunk on the premises, was referred, in concurrence, to the committee on Consumer Protection and Professional Licensure.
