Met according to adjournment at eleven o'clock A.M., in an Informal Session, with Mr. Garballey of Arlington in the Chair (having been appointed by the Speaker, under authority conferred by Rule 5, to perform the duties of the Chair).

At the request of the Chair (Mr. Garballey), the members, guests and employees joined with him in reciting the pledge of allegiance to the flag.

Silent Tribute.

During the session, the Chair (Mr. Garballey of Arlington), declared a brief recess, and at the request of Representatives Howitt of Seekonk and Barrows of Mansfield the members, guests and employees stood for a moment of silent tribute in respect to the memory of Bobby Salvo who passed away unexpectedly on June 21, 2022 at the age of sixty-three.

Born on December 28, 1958 in Stoughton to his late parents John and Helen, Bobby grew up in Easton and later made his home in Norton, where he raised his family and proudly founded S & L Construction, a family business he owned and operated for thirty-five years. He was a longtime member of the Norton Housing Authority, and formerly served as a member of the Norton Recreation Commission and Norton Lions Club. He also served as a Norton Call Firefighter and a Special Police Officer in the Town of Easton. Most notably, he will be remembered for serving 15 years on the Norton Select Board where he cemented his legacy as a pragmatic and dedicated public servant. He served with humility and was truly a man for others. As Bill Gouveia of the Sun Chronicle wrote about Salvo, "He did not promote himself or seek to glorify his own service. Bobby was someone that 'did the job' and didn't seek to be recognized for that accomplishment.".

In his spare time, Bobby cultivated many hobbies including cooking, grilling, gardening, and motorcycling. Above all else, Bobby enjoyed spending time with his loving family. His passing has left a void in the hearts of all who knew him. Bobby will be dearly missed by his wife of nearly 41 years, Dawn M. Salvo, his children (Ryan, Robert Jr., and Courtney, and their spouses), his brothers and sisters, friends, and his 7 adoring grandchildren (Dante, Paisley, Brayden, Brody, Elliana, Kinsley and Blake), who were the twinkle in his eye.

Wareham, charter. A petition (accompanied by bill) of Julian Cyr and Timothy R. Whelan for legislation to establish a sick leave bank for Nicole Sumner, an employee of the Department of Youth Services, came from the Senate referred, under suspension of Joint Rule 12, to the committee on Public Service.

The House then concurred with the Senate in the suspension of said rule; and the petition (accompanied by bill, Senate, No. 3130) was referred, in concurrence, to the committee on Public Service.

Authorizing the town of Norwell to establish a means tested senior citizen property tax exemption (House, No. 5063) [Local Approval Received];

Under suspension of Rule 7A, in each instance, on motion of Ms. Howard of Lowell, the bills severally were read a second time forthwith; and they were ordered to a third reading.

By Mr. Ryan of Boston, for the committee on Election Laws, on a petition, a Bill relative to voting precincts in the city of Revere (House, No. 5328) [Local Approval Received]. Read; and referred, under Rule 7A, to the committee on Steering, Policy and Scheduling.

The engrossed Bill authorizing the Division of Capital Asset Management and Maintenance to convey a certain parcel of land to the school department in the city of Westfield (see House, No. 5156, amended), having been certified by the Clerk to be rightly and truly prepared for final passage, was considered, the question being on adopting the emergency preamble.

A separate vote was taken, as required by the provisions of Article XLVIII (as amended by Article LXVII) of the Amendments to the Constitution; and the preamble was adopted, by a vote of 4 to 0. Sent to the Senate for concurrence.

Subsequently, the Senate having concurred in adoption of the emergency preamble, the bill (which originated in the House) was passed to be enacted; and it was signed by the acting Speaker and sent to the Senate.

Severally having been certified by the Clerk to be rightly and truly prepared for final passage, were passed to be enacted; and they were signed by the acting Speaker and sent to the Senate.

The Senate amendment of the House Bill exempting the positions of police chief and police captain in the city of Leominster from the civil service law (House, No. 3756), reported by the committee on Bills in the Third Reading to be correctly drawn, was adopted, in concurrence.

Third reading bills. The House Bill relative to tort actions for latent diseases (House, No. 1863), was read a second time; and it was ordered to a third reading.

The House Bill relative to Rosa Parks day (House, No. 3189), reported by the committee on Bills in the Third Reading to be correctly drawn, was read a third time.

Pending the question on passing the bill to be engrossed, Ms. Garlick of Needham moved to amend it by striking out section 2; and by inserting before the enacting clause the following emergency preamble:

"*Whereas*, The deferred operation of this act would tend to defeat its purpose, which is to establish forthwith February 4th as Rosa Parks Day, therefore it is hereby declared to be an emergency law, necessary for the immediate preservation of the public convenience."

The amendment was adopted; and the bill (House, No. 3189, amended) was passed to be engrossed. Sent to the Senate for concurrence.

The House Bill relative to the charter of the town of Provincetown (House, No. 5081), reported by the committee on Bills in the Third Reading to be correctly drawn, was read a third time.

Pending the question on passing the bill to be engrossed, Ms. Garlick of Needham moved to amend it by striking out section 4 and inserting in place thereof the following section:

"SECTION 4. Section 1 of chapter 7 of said charter is hereby amended by striking out subsection (a) and inserting in place thereof the following subsection:—

a. The Chief of Police shall be a resident of Provincetown or Truro. The Director of Public Works shall reside within 45 driving miles of the Town of Provincetown. The Chief of Police and the Director of Public Works shall meet the requirements of this section within six months of assuming office.".

The amendment was adopted; and the bill (House, No. 5081, amended) was passed to be engrossed. Sent to the Senate for concurrence.
