Met according to adjournment at eleven o'clock A.M., in an Informal Session, with Mr. Ryan of Boston in the Chair (having been appointed by the Speaker, under authority conferred by Rule 5, to perform the duties of the Chair).

At the request of the Chair (Mr. Ryan), the members, guests and employees joined with him in reciting the pledge of allegiance to the flag.

Valedictory Addresses.

During the session, the Speaker took the Chair, declared a recess, and there being no objection, introduced the following members, who were not returning for the 2023-2024 Legislative Session and a former member who had previously departed from the 2021-2022 Legislative Session, who then addressed the House regarding their departure from service in the House of Representatives: Representatives Belsito of Topsfield; Oliveira of Ludlow; Elugardo of Boston; Minicucci of North Andover; Gouveia of Acton; Whelan of Brewster; Tucker of Salem; Dooley of Norfolk; Malia of Boston; and Wagner of Chicopee; and former Representative Ehrlich of Marblehead.

Resolutions.

Resolutions (filed with the Clerk by Mr. Galvin of Canton) commending Sergeant Robert Deyeso for his outstanding military service during World War II, were referred, under Rule 85, to the committee on Rules.

Mr. Galvin, for said committee, reported that the resolutions ought to be adopted. Under suspension of the rules, on motion of Mr. O'Day of West Boylston, the resolutions (reported by the committee on Bills in the Third Reading to be correctly drawn) were considered forthwith; and they were adopted.

The following order (filed by Mr. Gordon of Bedford) was referred, under Joint Rule 30, to the committees on Rules of the two branches, acting concurrently:

Papers from the Senate.

The House Bill authorizing the Department of Environmental Protection to issue a waterways license to the Commercial Wharf East Condominium Association confirming and authorizing the Commercial Wharf East Condominium Association's uses and structures located on private tidelands (House, No. 5080) (its title having been changed by the Senate committee on Bills in the Third Reading), came from the Senate passed to be engrossed, in concurrence, with amendments striking out all after the enacting clause and inserting in place thereof the text contained in Senate document numbered 3148; and inserting before the enacting clause the following emergency preamble:

"*Whereas*, the deferred operation of this act would tend to defeat its purpose, which is to authorize the department of environmental protection to issue a certain waterways license, therefore it is hereby declared to be an emergency law, necessary for the immediate preservation of the public convenience.".

The amendments were referred, under Rule 35, to the committee on Bills in the Third Reading. Said committee then reported that the amendments were correctly drawn; and they were adopted, in concurrence.

The House Bill establishing recall elections in the town of Otis (House, No. 826, amended), came from the Senate passed to be engrossed, in concurrence, with an amendment striking out all after the enacting clause and inserting in place thereof the text contained in Senate document numbered 3149. The amendment was referred, under Rule 35, to the committee on Bills in the Third Reading.

Under suspension of Rule 7A, on motion of Mr. Tucker of Salem, the bill was read a second time forthwith.

The amendment recommended by the committee on Ways and Means then was adopted; and the bill (Senate, No. 2933, amended) was ordered to a third reading.

Emergency Measure.

The engrossed Bill establishing a sick leave bank for Philip Cloutier, an employee of the Department of Mental Health (see Senate, No. 3134), having been certified by the Clerk to be rightly and truly prepared for final passage, was considered, the question being on adopting the emergency preamble.

A separate vote was taken, as required by the provisions of Article XLVIII (as amended by Article LXVII) of the Amendments to the Constitution; and the preamble was adopted, by a vote of 3 to 0. Sent to the Senate for concurrence.

Subsequently, the Senate having concurred in adoption of the emergency preamble, the bill (which originated in the Senate) was passed to be enacted; and it was signed by the acting Speaker and Senate to the Senate.
