By Representative Giannino of Revere, a petition (accompanied by bill, House, No. 4823) of Jessica Ann Giannino (with the approval of the mayor and city council) that the city of Revere be authorized to grant up to two additional licenses for the sale of all alcoholic beverages not to be drunk on the premises in said city. By Representatives Vieira of Falmouth and Fernandes of Falmouth, a petition (accompanied by bill, House, No. 4827) of David T. Vieira and Dylan A. Fernandes (by vote of the town) that the town of Falmouth be authorized to establish a real estate

Paper from the Senate.

The House Bill relative to the Affordable Homes Act (House, No. 4726), came from the Senate passed to be engrossed, in concurrence, with an amendment striking out all after the enacting clause and inserting in place thereof the text contained in Senate document numbered 2850.

Affordable housing,—bond bill.

Under suspension of the rules, on motion of Mr. Owens of Watertown, the amendment was considered forthwith. The House then non-concurred with the Senate in its amendment; and, on further motion of Mr. Arciero of Westford, asked for a committee of conference on the disagreeing votes of the two branches. Representatives Arciero, Michlewitz of Boston and DeCoste of Norwell were appointed to the committee on the part of the House. Sent to the Senate to be joined.

Reports of Committees.

By Mr. Galvin of Canton, for the committee on Rules and the committees on Rules of the two branches, acting concurrently, that Joint Rule 12 be suspended on the petition (subject to Joint Rule 12) of James K. Hawkins for legislation to establish an excise tax for certain applicable taxpayers in excess of the maximum permissible for single-family residences. Under suspension of the Rules, on motion of Mr. Donato of Medford, the report was considered forthwith. Joint Rule 12 was suspended; and the petition (accompanied by bill) was referred to the committee on Revenue. Sent to the Senate for concurrence.

By Mr. Honan of Boston, for the committee on Steering, Policy and Scheduling, that the following House bills be scheduled for consideration by the House:

Under suspension of Rule 7A, in each instance, on motion of Mr. Donato of Medford, the bills severally were read a second time forthwith; and they were ordered to a third reading.

Timilty memorial bridge (see House, No. 3383, amended) (which originated in the House), in respect to which the Senate had concurred in adoption of the emergency preamble, was passed to be enacted; and it was signed by the acting Speaker and sent to the Senate.
