#### Petitions.

#### Paper from the Senate.

The House Bill to rename the Massachusetts Rehabilitation Commission, MassAbility, to reflect the self-determination and limitless possibilities of people with disabilities (House, No. 4528), came from the Senate passed to be engrossed, in concurrence, with an amendment striking out all after the enacting clause and inserting in place thereof the text contained in Senate document numbered 2941. The amendment was referred, under Rule 35, to the committee on Bills in the Third Reading.
