Monday, January 27, 2025.

Met according to adjournment at eleven o'clock A.M., in an Informal Session, with Mr. Donato of Medford in the Chair (having been appointed by the Speaker, under authority conferred by Rule 5, to perform the duties of the Chair).

At the request of the Chair (Mr. Donato), the members, guests and employees joined with him in reciting the pledge of allegiance to the flag.

Message from the Governor.

A message from Her Excellency the Governor recommending legislation relative to financing long-term improvements to municipal road and bridges (House, No. 53), was filed in the office of the Clerk on Friday, January 24.

The message was read; and it was referred, under Rule 30, with the accompanying draft of a bill, to the committee on Transportation. Sent to the Senate for concurrence.

Appointments of the Minority Leader.

Notice was received that the House Republican Caucus had ratified the appointments by the Minority Leader, pursuant to House Rule 18, of Representatives Ferguson of Holden to the position of Assistant Minority Leader, Frost of Auburn to the position of Second Assistant Minority Leader and Smola of Warren as the ranking minority party member on the committee on Ways and Means.

A communication was received from the Minority Leader announcing that he had appointed Jim Peyser as his designee to serve on the K-12 Statewide Graduation Council established (under Executive Order 639) to advise the Governor and the Legislature on the development of a statewide graduation requirement.

Guests of the House.

At the beginning of the session, the Chair (Mr. Donato of Medford), declared a brief recess and introduced, seated in the Chamber, members of the Longmeadow boy's cross-country team, who are visiting the Statehouse to celebrate a monumental achievement for the Longmeadow Boys Cross Country Team.

On Saturday, November 16, 2024, they made history by securing their first-ever state title, and they did so with incredible depth and teamwork. The team's top five finishers crossed the line in 18th, 20th, 21st, 35th, and 37th, accumulating 101 points—more than 30 points ahead of runner-up Marblehead in a competitive field of 23 teams. The seven athletes who made this victory possible are Jacob Abebe (FR), Matt Cournoyer (JR), Spence Deliso (SR), Ethan Halpern (JR), Greg Keane (SR), Andrew Medeiros (SR), and Henry Sacco (SR). During the session, the Chair (Mr. Donato of Medford), declared a brief recess and introduced, seated in the House Chamber, the Division 3 State Champion Nipmuc girls soccer team. The team, who triumphantly defeated Medfield 1-0 in the finals, was led by 100-goal scorer Kyah Montano, who scored the game-winning goal in the 67th minute of action, securing the Nipmuc program their first state title since 2014. They were guests of Representatives Muradian of Grafton and Murray of Milford and Senator Fattman.
