There being no objection, the rules were suspended, on motion of Mr. Moore, and the bill wasread a second time.

Pending the question on ordering the bill to a third reading, Mr. Montigny presented thefollowing amendments:

Striking out all after the enacting clause, and inserting in place thereof the text of Senatedocument numbered 1746; and by striking out the title and inserting in place thereof thefollowing title: "An Act protecting the health and safety of consumers from certain managed carepractices in the insurance industry."

The amendments were adopted.

The bill as amended, was ordered to a third reading, read a third time and passed to beengrossed, in concurrence. Sent to the House for concurrence in the amendments.
