Communications.

The following communications were severally placed on file:

Communication from the Chairpersons of the Joint Committee on Natural Resources and Agriculture relative to the rules of procedure for the said committee for the present General Court (received Wednesday, February 28, 2001);

Communication from Diane Wholley, Director of Fiscal Services, Bridgewater Correctional Complex, submitting a plan of corrective action (received Tuesday, February 20, 2001); and

Communication from Dianne Wilkerson relative to the rules of procedure for the Joint Committee on State Administration for the 2001-2002 General Court (received Monday, February 26, 2001).

Reports.

The following reports were severally read and sent to the House for its information:

A report of the Special Commission on Forest Management Practices (under the provisions of Section 341 of Chapter 38 of the Acts of 1995, as most recently amended by Section 195 of Chapter 127 of the Acts of 1999) submitting a report on forest management practices (Senate, No. 1823) (received Wednesday, February 28, 2001); and

A report of the Department of Public Health (under the provisions of Sections 5 and 20 of Chapter 111 of the General Laws) relative to inspection of M.C.I. Concord (received Tuesday, February 27, 2001).

Petition.

Honan that businesses providing in-line skates, bicycles or scooters also provide protective headgear and other safety equipment, and recommending that the same be referred to the committee on Public Safety,— **was considered forthwith, under Senate Rule 36, and accepted, in concurrence.**

Petition.

On motion of Ms. Chandler, Senate Rule 20 and Joint Rule 12 were suspended on the petition, presented by Mr. Glodis (accompanied by bill) of Guy W. Glodis and George N. Peterson, Jr., for legislation relative to the pension allowance of former registry police officer Anthony Martinello,— **and the same was referred to the committee on Public Service.**

Sent to the House for concurrence.

Reports of Committees.

By Ms. Menard, for the committees on Rules of the two branches, acting concurrently, that Joint Rule 12 be suspended on the Senate petition of Stephen M. Brewer and David C. Bunker, Jr., for legislation to provide children of state employees killed while on duty tuition to state colleges and the state university.

Senate Rule 36 was suspended, on motion of Ms. Murray, and the report was considered forthwith. Joint Rule 12 was suspended; and the petition (accompanied by bill) was referred to the committee on Education, Arts and Humanities.

By Ms. Menard, for the committees on Rules of the two branches, acting concurrently, that Joint Rule 12 be suspended on the Senate petition of Edward Brassil and Steven A. Tolman for legislation to provide for an inquiry into the safety of low pressure boilers.

Senate Rule 36 was suspended, on motion of Ms. Murray, and the report was considered forthwith. Joint Rule 12 was suspended; and the petition (accompanied by bill) was referred to the committee on Public Safety. Severally sent to the House for concurrence.
