Adjournment in Memory of Judge Allan McGuane.

Mr. Rosenberg moved that when the Senate adjourns today, it adjourn in memory of Judge Allan McGuane, a former Representative from Greenfield who died New Year's Day, 2003.

Judge McGuane was born in Eastern Massachusetts and lived there until he moved with his family to Greenfield and lived there until he entered the United States Naval Academy. After receiving his law degree from Boston University School of Law, Judge McGuane returned and practiced law in Greenfield. Judge McGuane was a member of the House of Representatives from 1960 to 1975 when then Governor Dukakis appointed him to the Greenfield District Court. He served there until his retirement in 1992, establishing a standard of congeniality and respect in and out of the courtroom. The motion prevailed.
