Thursday, May 1, 2003.

Met at nine minutes past one o'clock P.M.

The President, members, guests and employees then recited the pledge of allegiance to the flag.

Distinguished Guests.

Mr. Rosenberg in the Chair,— there being no objection, the Chair (Mr. Rosenberg) introduced the Amherst Regional High School boys basketball team, Division 1 Massachusetts State Champions. The team is also the 2003 Division 1 Western Massachusetts champions. The team was accompanied by their coach, Jim Matuszko, and all were the guests of Senator Rosenberg.

Communication.

The President in the Chair,— a communication from the State of Arizona transmitting a copy of concurrent Resolution 1022 rescinding all of said state's previous calls for a constitutional convention to amend the Constitution of the United States (received Wednesday, April 30, 2003),— was placed on file.

Petitions.

Mr. Barrios presented a petition (accompanied by bill, Senate, No. 1986) of Jarrett T. Barrios (with the approval of the mayor and city council) for legislation relative to the revaluation of real and personal property in the city of Revere [Local approval received],— and the same was referred, under Senate Rule 20, to the committee on Taxation.

Sent to the House for concurrence.

Mr. Panagiotakos presented a petition (subject to Joint Rule 12) of Steven C. Pangiotakos, Thomas A. Golden, Jr., David M. Nangle and Kevin J. Murphy for legislation to establish a sick leave bank for Christopher Boumil, an employee of the Department of Correction,— and the same was referred, under Senate Rule 20, to the committees on Rules of the two branches, acting concurrently.

Whereas, the adoption of such tax revenue forecast will make a significant contribution to a balanced budget and fiscal stability; now therefore be it

Resolved, that the Massachusetts Senate hereby finds and declares that the amount of tax revenue available for the general appropriation act for fiscal year 2004, in the absence of any changes in statute relating to taxation enacted after February 1, 2003, shall not exceed \$13,993,719,500; and be it further

Resolved, that a copy of this resolution be forwarded by the Clerk of the Senate to His Excellency Mitt Romney, governor of the commonwealth.

SECTION 3. This act shall apply only to the salaries of public employees payable on or before October 1, 2003, unless, notwithstanding section 31 of chapter 29 of the General Laws or any other general or special law to the contrary, the governor from time to time by executive order extends this period for not more than 6 months at a time, and in no case later than September 11, 2005.".
