Thursday, March 15, 2007.

Met at one minute past eleven o'clock A.M. (Mr. Havern in the Chair) (having been appointed by the President, under authority conferred by Senate Rule 4, to perform the duties of the Chair).

The Chair (Mr. Havern), members, guests and employees then recited the pledge of allegiance to the flag.

PAPER FROM THE HOUSE.

Emergency Preamble Adopted; Engrossed Bill Enacted.

An engrossed Bill establishing a sick leave bank for Karen White, an employee of the Trial Court of the Commonwealth (see House, No. 1659, amended), having been certified by the Senate Clerk to be rightly and truly prepared for final passage and containing an emergency preamble,— was laid before the Senate; and, a separate vote being taken in accordance with the requirements of Article LXVII of the Amendments to the Constitution, the preamble was adopted, in concurrence, by a vote of 3 to 0.

The bill was signed by the Acting President (Mr. Havern) and sent to the House for enactment.

Subsequently, the bill, which originated in the House, came from the House with the endorsement that it had been enacted in that branch.

The Senate then passed the bill to be enacted; and it was signed by the Acting President (Mr. Havern) and laid before the Governor for his approbation.

Adjournment in Memory of Justice Martha B. Sosman.

The Senator from Middlesex, Ms. Fargo, presented a request that when the Senate adjourns today, it do so in memory of Massachusetts Supreme Court Justice Martha B. Sosman.

Justice Sosman passed away on Saturday after a distinguished legal career in the state. Raised in Concord, Justice Sosman worked as a Boston lawyer and assistant U.S. attorney before being appointed to the SJC in 2000. Her honorable and distinguished service to the Commonwealth will not soon be forgotten.

Accordingly, as a mark of respect to the memory of Justice Martha B. Sosman, at nineteen minutes past eleven o'clock A.M. on motion of Mr. Knapik, the Senate adjourned to meet again on Monday next at eleven o'clock A.M.
