Adjournment in Memory of Ken Olsen

The Senator from Essex and Middlesex, Mr. Finegold, and the Senator from Middlesex and Worcester, Mr. Eldridge, requested that when the Senate adjourns today, it adjourn in memory of Ken Olsen

Ken Olsen, a pioneer and entrepreneur who helped to create the computer industry with his company, Digital Equipment Corp., passed away on February 6th at the age of 84. Mr. Olsen's contributions to Massachusetts and the world with his innovations in technology cannot be overstated.

Digital Equipment Corp. was launched in 1957 in a vacant mill in Maynard with \$70,000 and three employees. Digital grew to employ 125,000 employees in 86 countries before it was purchased by Compaq for \$9.6 billion in 1998. Digital pioneered the idea of computers that were available to the individual, creating "minicomputers" for commercial use; smaller, less-expensive alternatives to the mainframes that were available at the time.

With Digital's influence, Massachusetts became a world-wide center for high-tech innovation. Along with Wang Laboratories, Digital is credited with creating the "Massachusetts Miracle," a period of enormous growth in the 1980s. In 1986, Mr. Olsen was named the "most successful entrepreneur in the history of American business" by Fortune magazine. He was also inducted into the National Inventor's Hall of Fame, the Computer History Museum, and awarded the National Medal of Technology in 1993.

Beyond his giant achievements in the world of technology, Mr. Olsen's deep faith as a Christian informed his life and his work. His motto, "Do the Right Thing," and his skill as a leader set the tone at Digital. He was seen as an empowering manager whose work to decentralize his company became a model for innovative and effective management. Mr. Olsen's contributions to Massachusetts and the world at large will long be with us.

Accordingly, as a mark of respect to the memory of Ken Olsen, at twelve minutes before four o'clock P.M., on motion of Mr. Baddour, the Senate adjourned to meet again on Monday next at eleven o'clock A.M.
