JOURNAL OF THE SENATE.

Monday, January 13, 2014.

Met at five minutes past eleven o'clock A.M. (Ms. Flanagan in the Chair) (having been appointed by the Chair, under authority conferred by Senate Rule 4, to perform the duties of the Chair).

The Chair (Ms. Flanagan), members, guests and staff then recited the pledge of allegiance to the flag.

Reports.

Report of MassDevelopment (pursuant to Section 12 of Chapter 238 of the Acts of 2012) submitting the second annual report of the Advanced Manufacturing Futures Program (copies having been forwarded to the Chair of the Senate Committee on Ways and Means and the Senate Chairs the joint committee on economic development and emerging technologies and the joint committee on labor and workforce development) (received December 30, 2013),-- was placed on file.

The following reports were severally read and sent to the House for its information:

Report of the District Attorney of Suffolk County (under the provisions of Section 99 of Chapter 272 of the General Laws) submitting a report relative to wiretaps for the calendar year 2013 (received January 9, 2014);

Report of the District Attorney of Bristol County (under the provisions of Section 99 of Chapter 272 of the General Laws) submitting a report relative to wiretaps for the calendar year 2013 (received January 9, 2014);

Report of the District Attorney of Plymouth County (under the provisions of Section 99 of Chapter 272 of the General Laws) submitting a report relative to wiretaps for the calendar year 2013 (received January 10, 2014);

Relative to water service in the town of Somerset (House, No. 3618, amended,-- on petition) [Local approval received]; Authorizing the town of Dartmouth to accept certain roadways as public ways (House, No. 3697,-- on petition) [Local approval received]; and

Authorizing the town of Hadley to grant 6 additional licenses for the sale of all alcoholic beverages and 6 additional licenses for the sale of wines and malt beverages to be drunk on the premises (House, No. 3790,-- on House, No. 3769) [Local approval received on House, No. 3769];

Were severally read and, under Senate Rule 26, placed in the Orders of the Day for the next session.

The annual report of the Public Employee Retirement Administration Commission (under sections 21, 102 and 103 of chapter 32 of the General Laws) relative to the percentum change in the average cost-of-living as shown by the United States consumer price index for the year 2013 compared with such index for the year 2012 (House, No. 3837),-- came from the House, with the endorsement that it had been referred to the committee on Public Service; and the Senate concurred in the reference.

Matter Taken Out of the Orders of the Day.

There being no objection, the following matter was taken out of the Orders of the Day and considered as follows: The House Bill amending the special legislation establishing the Acton community housing corporation (House, No. 3833),-- was read a second time, ordered to a third reading, read a third time and passed to be engrossed, in concurrence.

Reports of Committees.

Mr. Rosenberg, for the committee on Ethics and Rules, reported, that the following matter be placed in the Orders of the Day for the next session:

The House Bill relative to membership in the Governor's Highway Safety Committee (House, No. 3787).

There being no objection, the rules were suspended, on motion of Mr. Tarr, and the bill was read a second time, ordered to a third reading, read a third time and passed to be engrossed, in concurrence.

By Mr. Brewer, for the committee on Ways and Means, that the Senate Bill establishing a sick leave bank for Denise McKinnon, an employee of the Massachusetts Hospital School (Senate, No. 1955),-- ought to pass, with an amendment substituting a new draft with the same title (Senate, No. 1973).

There being no objection, the rules were suspended, on motion of Mr. Tarr, and the bill was read a second time and was amended, as recommended by the committee on Ways and Means.

The bill (Senate, No. 1973) was then ordered to a third reading, read a third time and passed to be engrossed. Sent to the House for concurrence.

The House Bill authorizing the Commissioner of Capital Asset Management and Maintenance to convey certain land to the town of Belmont for recreation, public works or other municipal purposes (House, No. 2869, changed and amended),-- ought to pass. There being no objection, the rules were suspended, on motion of Mr. Tarr, and the bill was read a second time, ordered to a third reading, read a third time and passed to be engrossed, in concurrence.

Engrossed Bill.

An engrossed Bill authorizing the town of Lincoln to grant a license for the sale of wines and malt beverages to be drunk on the premises (see House, No. 3531) (which originated in the House), having been certified by the Senate Clerk to be rightly and truly prepared for final passage, was passed to be enacted and signed by the Acting President (Ms. Flanagan) and laid before the Governor for his approbation.
