### JOURNAL OF THE SENATE.

*Tuesday, May 27, 2014.*

Met at two minutes past eleven o'clock A.M. (Ms. Donoghue in the Chair) (having been appointed by the President, under authority conferred by Senate Rule 4, to perform the duties of the Chair).

The Chair (Ms. Donoghue), members, guests and staff then recited the pledge of allegiance to the flag.

#### *Report.*

Report of the Plymouth County Registry of Deeds (under the provisions of Section 2KKK of Chapter 29 of the General Laws) submitting its plan for expenditure from the County Registers Technological Fund (copies having been forwarded as required to the Senate Committees on Ways and Means and Post Audit and Oversight) (received Monday, April 14, 2014),-- **was placed on file.**

#### *Reports of Committees.*

By Mr. Lewis, for the committee on Public Service, on petition, a Bill to establish a sick leave bank for Denise Frost, an employee of the Department of Developmental Services (Senate, No. 2150);

**Read and, under Senate Rule 27, referred to the committee on Ways and Means.**

By Ms. Forry, for the committee on Municipalities and Regional Government, ought NOT to pass, on the petition (accompanied by bill, Senate, No. 970) of Michael F. Rush, Mayor Thomas M. *Emergency Preamble Adopted.*

An engrossed Bill making appropriations for the fiscal year 2014 to provide for supplementing certain existing appropriations and for certain other activities and projects (see House, No. 4081, amended), having been certified by the Senate Clerk to be rightly and truly prepared for final passage and containing an emergency preamble,-- **was laid before the Senate; and, a separate vote being taken in accordance with the requirements of Article LXVII of the Amendments to the Constitution, the preamble was adopted in concurrence, by a vote of 2 to 0.**

**The bill was signed by the Acting President (Ms. Donoghue) and sent to the House for enactment.**

*Engrossed Bill.*

An engrossed Bill relative to the town of Dennis Barrier Beach Protection Stabilization Fund (see House, No. 3630) (which originated in the House), having been certified by the Senate Clerk to be rightly and truly prepared for final passage, was passed to be enacted and signed by the Acting President (Ms. Donoghue) and laid before the Governor for his approbation.

*Recess.*

There being no objection, at twenty-six minutes past eleven o'clock A.M., the Chair (Ms. Donoghue) declared a recess subject to the call of the Chair; and, at twenty-seven minutes past one o'clock P.M., the Senate reassembled, Ms. Donoghue in the Chair.
