Monday, September 15, 2014.

Met at one minute past eleven o'clock A.M. (Mr. Donnelly in the Chair) (having been appointed by the President, under authority conferred by Senate Rule 4, to perform the duties of the Chair).

The Chair (Mr. Donnelly), members, guests and staff then recited the pledge of allegiance to the flag.

Communication.

Communication from the Honorable Bruce E. Tarr, Senate Minority Leader, announcing the appointment (pursuant to Section 124 of Chapter 165 of the Acts of 2014) of Edward Moscovitch of Gloucester to the Foundation Budget Review Commission, was placed on file.

Petition.

Mr. Michael O. Moore presented a petition (subject to Joint Rule 12) of Michael O. Moore for legislation to establish a sick leave bank for Emily Coollick-Burgess, an employee of the Massachusetts Rehabilitation Commission,— and the same was referred, under Senate Rule 20, to the committees on Rules of the two branches, acting concurrently.

Emergency Preambles Adopted

An engrossed Bill establishing a sick leave bank for Kathleen Restuccia, an employee of the Trial Court (see House, No. 4381, amended), having been certified by the Senate Clerk to be rightly and truly prepared for final passage and containing an emergency preamble,— was laid before the Senate; and, a separate vote being taken in accordance with the requirements of Article LXVII of the Amendments to the Constitution, the preamble was adopted in concurrence, by a vote of 3 to 0. The bill was signed by the Acting President (Mr. Donnelly) and sent to the House for enactment.

An engrossed Bill establishing a sick leave bank for Michael J. Macuch, an employee of the Department of Correction (see House, No. 4407, amended), having been certified by the Senate Clerk to be rightly and truly prepared for final passage and containing an emergency preamble,— was laid before the Senate; and, a separate vote being taken in accordance with the requirements of Article LXVII of the Amendments to the Constitution, the preamble was adopted in concurrence, by a vote of 3 to 0.

The bill was signed by the Acting President (Mr. Donnelly) and sent to the House for enactment.

Designating a certain boat launch area in the town of Hardwick as the Stephen M. Brewer Fishing Area (see House, No. 4032); and

Authorizing the town of Conway to continue the employment of police officer David Johnson (see House, No. 4195).

Adjourn In Memory of Charles "Charlie" J. Ahern

The Senator from Middlesex, Mr. Donnelly, moved that when the Senate adjourns today, it do so in memory of Charles "Charlie" J. Ahern of Arlington.

Charlie Ahern was born on January 19, 1921. He graduated Boston College in 1942. He was a World War II US Marine veteran serving as a captain in the 4th Division, F Company, 2nd Battalion, 23rd Regiment. He earned a Silver Star for conspicuous gallantry on Iwo Jima as well as receiving two purple hearts for wounds sustained on both Tinian and Iwo Jima.

Charlie was also a longtime member of the US Customs Service and a member of the Lexington Golf Club.

Charlie was the beloved husband of the late Helen C. (Hallisey) Ahern, and brother of the late Thomas and Robert Ahern and Ruth Shannon. He is survived by his sons Charles and his wife Sandra of Marietta, Georgia, Robert and his wife Kathleen of Arlington, and Marty and his wife Lisa of Seattle, Washington. In addition, he is survived by four grandchildren: Jennifer, Carol Ann, Jane and Peter Charles.

Charlie attended the Iwo Jima Day ceremonies each year here at the State House. It was my honor to escort him to the ceremony every year and have the opportunity to thank him for his service to our country. Iwo Jima Day will not be the same without Charlie here with us.

Accordingly, as a mark of respect in memory of Charles "Charlie" J. Ahern at twenty-one minutes past eleven o'clock A.M., on motion of Mr. Timilty, the Senate adjourned to meet again on Thursday next at eleven o'clock A.M.
