Thursday, June 8, 2017.

Met at six minutes past eleven o'clock A.M. (Ms. Gobi in the Chair) (having been appointed by the President, under authority conferred by Senate Rule 4, to perform the duties of the Chair).

The Chair (Ms. Gobi), members, guests and staff then recited the pledge of allegiance to the flag.

Fattman and other members of the General Court for legislation to decrease food waste by standardizing the date labeling of food,-- and recommending that the same be referred to the committee on Public Health;

Under Senate Rule 36, the report was considered forthwith and accepted. Sent to the House for concurrence.

An engrossed Bill establishing a sick leave bank for Dean Canada, an employee of the Department of Correction (see Senate, No. 2073), having been certified by the Senate Clerk to be rightly and truly prepared for final passage and containing an emergency preamble,-- was laid before the Senate; and, a separate vote being taken in accordance with the requirements of Article LXVII of the Amendments to the Constitution, the preamble was adopted in concurrence, by a vote of 2 to 0.

The bill was signed by the Acting President (Ms. Gobi) and sent to the House for enactment.

PAPERS FROM THE HOUSE.

The House Bill making appropriations for the fiscal year 2017 to provide for supplementing certain existing appropriations and for certain other activities and projects (House, No. 3718, amended),-- came from the House with the endorsement that the House had concurred in the Senate amendment *with a further amendment* by striking out section 7 (inserted by amendment by the Senate).

The rules were suspended, on motion of Mr. Tarr, and the further House amendment was adopted, in concurrence.

A petition (accompanied by bill, House, No. 3743) of James M. Cantwell, Patrick M. O'Connor and others relative to civil liability for improper flood hazard determinations,-- was referred in concurrence, under suspension of Joint Rule 12, to the committee on Financial Services.

Matter Taken Out of the Orders of the Day.

There being no objection, the following matter was taken out of the Orders of the Day and considered as follows:

The House Bill authorizing the town of Deerfield to convey a certain parcel of land (printed in House, No. 3670) (its title having been changed by the committee on Bills in the Third Reading),-- was read a third time.

Pending the question on passing the bill to be engrossed, Mr. Rosenberg presented an amendment striking out section 1 and inserting in place thereof the following section:-

"SECTION 1. Notwithstanding section 16 of chapter 30B of the General Laws, the town of Deerfield, acting by and through its board of selectmen, may convey to New England Natural Bakers, Inc. a certain parcel of land identified as 'Lot 2' on a plan entitled "Subdivision Approval Not Required' Plan of Land in Deerfield, Massachusetts, Prepared for the Town of Deerfield", dated September 30, 2016 and recorded in the Franklin district registry of deeds at plan book 140 page 41."

The amendment as adopted.

The bill, as amended, was then passed to be engrossed, in concurrence with the amendment.
