Met at eleven minutes past eleven o'clock A.M. (Mr. Boncore in the Chair) (having been appointed by the President, under authority conferred by Senate Rule 4, to perform the duties of the Chair).

The Senator from Essex and Middlesex, Mr. Tarr, then led the Chair (Mr. Boncore), members, guests and staff in the recitation of the pledge of allegiance to the flag.

Engrossed Bills.

The following engrossed bills (all of which originated in the House), having been certified by the Senate Clerk to be rightly and truly prepared for final passage, were severally passed to be enacted and were signed by the Acting President (Mr. Boncore) and laid before the Governor for his approbation, to wit:

Establishing a sick leave bank for Pamela Dube, an employee of the Department of Developmental Services (see House, No. 3651, amended).

An engrossed Bill authorizing the town of Deerfield to convey a certain parcel of land (see House Bill, printed in House, No. 3670, amended) (which originated in the House), having been certified by the Senate Clerk to be rightly and truly prepared for final passage was passed to be enacted, two-thirds of the members present having voted in the affirmative, and signed by the Acting President (Mr. Boncore) and laid before the Governor for his approbation.

Recess.

There being no objection, at nineteen minutes past eleven o'clock A.M., the Chair (Mr. Boncore) declared a recess subject to the call of the Chair; and, at twenty-five minutes before one o'clock P.M., the Senate reassembled, the Mr. Boncore in the Chair.

All such amendments shall be second-reading amendments to the recommended Jehlen new text (Senate, No. 2090) but further amendments in the third degree to such amendments shall be in order. The Clerk shall further specify the procedure and format for filing all amendments, consistent with this order.

After the bill as amended is ordered to a third reading, it shall immediately be read a third time and the question shall then immediately be on passing it to be engrossed, and no amendments shall be in order at the third reading of the bill unless recommended by the committee on Bills in the Third Reading.
