# Adjournment in Memory of Lt. Richard Knowlton.

Mr. Cyr moved that when the Senate adjourned today, it do so in memory of retired Hyannis fire Lt. Richard Knowlton of Barnstable. Mr. Knowlton passed away on August 4, 2018 after a courageous battle with cancer.

A native Arkansas, Mr. Knowlton moved with his parents to Cape Cod at an early age. Mr. Knowlton graduated from Dennis Yarmouth Public High School in 1977. His commitment to public service was evident at an early age, as he then enlisted in the United States Air Force. He would serve his country for more than three years as a missile crew chief and medical specialist before being honorably discharged.

Following his military service, Mr. Knowlton returned to Cape Cod to serve his hometown communities. He began his firefighting career in Yarmouth, before being hired full time by the Hyannis Fire Department in 1982. Throughout his three-decade career, Mr. Knowlton was a model first responder who earned the respect and admiration of the many he served. As Barnstable Police Lt. John Murphy remarked, "He was the consummate public servant who put the public and his profession first". In recognition of his exceptional service, Mr. Knowlton was promoted to Lieutenant in 1993 and received the Massachusetts Firefighter of the Year Award in 2008.

Even after his retirement from firefighting, Mr. Knowlton continued to be an active citizen by becoming the co-director of the Cape and Islands Emergency Medical Services System. He excelled in this role until his recent passing.
