Ordered, That, notwithstanding any rule to the contrary, there shall be a Special Senate working group to assess the ongoing impacts of the federal shutdown and develop recommendations to mitigate impacts on Massachusetts residents. The committee shall consist of 7 members of the Senate, 2 of whom shall be appointed by the minority leader. The Senate President shall designate 1 appointee as the chair of the committee. The working group shall dissolve not later than 30 days after the lapse in federal appropriation ends or upon a vote of the committee, whichever comes first. The committee may hold hearings and file a report of its findings and recommendations with the clerk of the senate. The clerk shall make any report publicly available on the legislature's website (Senate, No. 11).

Adjourn In Honor of International Holocaust Remembrance Day and

In Memory of the Liberation of Auschwitz-Birkenau

The Senator from Middlesex and Norfolk, Ms. Creem, moved that when the Senate adjourns today it adjourn in honor of International Holocaust Remembrance Day and in memory of the January 27, 1945 liberation of Auschwitz-Birkenau, the largest Nazi death camp.

In 2005, the United Nations General Assembly designated January 27 as International Holocaust Remembrance Day (IHRD), an annual day of commemoration to honor the victims of the Nazi era.

The U.N.'s International Holocaust Remembrance Day resolution rejects denial of the Holocaust, and condemns discrimination and violence based on religion or ethnicity.

Accordingly, as a mark of respect in honor of International Holocaust Remembrance Day and in memory of the Liberation of Auschwitz-Birkenau, at fourteen minutes past two o'clock P.M., on motion of Mr. Tarr, the Senate adjourned to meet again on Monday next at eleven o'clock A.M.
