# JOURNAL OF THE SENATE

Thursday, March 5, 2020.

Met at nineteen minutes past eleven o'clock A.M. (Ms. Lovely in the Chair) (having been appointed by the President, under authority conferred by Senate Rule 4, to perform the duties of the Chair).

The Chair (Ms. Lovely), members, guests and staff then recited the pledge of allegiance to the flag.

The Senate welcomed them with applause and they withdrew from the Chamber.

Marguerite, beloved wife of William J. Coughlin, passed away on January 6, 2020 at the Rosewood Rehabilitation Center in Peabody, after a brief illness. Marguerite was born in Melrose to the late Edward and Genevieve Waitt.

Mrs. Coughlin was a dedicated teacher in Beverly at the Centerville Elementary School, and kept in touch with her former students, being invited to many special events in their lives in the years to come.

Marguerite was well remembered as a member of the Planning Board and received a plaque from former Mayor William Scanlon attesting to her many years of active service.
