Met at four minutes past eleven o'clock A.M. (Mr. Rodrigues in the Chair) (having been appointed by the President, under authority conferred by Senate Rule 4, to perform the duties of the Chair).

The Chair (Mr. Rodrigues), members, guests and staff then recited the pledge of allegiance to the flag.

Emergency Preamble Adopted.

An engrossed Bill establishing a sick leave bank for Jessica Renehan, an employee of the department of conservation and recreation (see House, No. 4410), having been certified by the Senate Clerk to be rightly and truly prepared for final passage and containing an emergency preamble,-- was laid before the Senate; and, a separate vote being taken in accordance with the requirements of Article LXVII of the Amendments to the Constitution, the preamble was adopted in concurrence, by a vote of 3 to 0.

The bill was signed by the Acting President (Mr. Rodrigues) and sent to the House for enactment.

Reports of a Committee.

Ms. Lovely, for the committee on Rules, reported that the following matters be placed in the Orders of the Day for the next session:

The Senate Bill designating a certain bridge in the city of Taunton the PFC Aaron Cordoba-Martinez Bridge (Senate, No. 2132).

There being no objection, the rules were suspended, on motion of Ms. Rausch, and the bill was read a second time, ordered to a third reading, read a third time and passed to be engrossed, its title having been changed by the committee on Bills in the Third Reading to read as follows: "An Act designating a certain bridge in the city of Taunton as the Private First Class Aaron Cordoba-Martinez Bridge". Sent to the House for concurrence.

Adjournment in Memory of David Lane.

The Senator from Essex and Middlesex, Mr. Tarr, moved that when the Senate adjourns today, it do so in memory of former U.S. Navy veteran and member of the Massachusetts House of Representatives, David Lane of Essex, who died on February 13, 2020 at the age of 92.

Dave was an incredibly accomplished individual who inspired all those who had the pleasure of being around him. Growing up, Dave attended Harvard University and graduated with a degree in Engineering. During his time at Harvard, he enlisted in the U.S. Navy and served toward the end of WWII. Once he met his lovely wife, Claire Beckham, in New York City, the two decided to move to his family farm in Essex, MA. During his career, Dave served as the Chairman of Hastings-Tapley Insurance Agency and in 2014 was even awarded "Insurance Professional of the Year" by Insurance Liberty Association in Boston. In addition to his insurance background, Dave was highly-active in elective public service and had never lost an election in over three decades. When elected to serve on the Massachusetts House of Representatives, Dave represented several towns including his home town, Gloucester, MA. Dave's commitment to his community was evident from his time serving as Essex Town Moderator for 25 years and his involvement as a Trustee of City on a Hill Charter High School as well as a member on the Board of Directors of Oak Hill. Dave was consistently looking for ways to get involved and better the lives of those around him. His Charity work is one of the many things that show his commitment to education, environment, and local historic preservation.

Outside of his impressive career and philanthropic contributions, Dave loved to travel
