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Met at thirteen minutes past eleven o'clock A.M. (Mr. Brownsberger in the Chair) (having been appointed by the President, under authority conferred by Senate Rule 4, to perform the duties of the Chair).

PAPERS FROM THE HOUSE.

Petitions were severally referred, in concurrence, as follows:

Petition (accompanied by bill, House, No. 4588) of Elizabeth A. Poirier (by vote of the town) that the town of North Attleborough be authorized to grant two additional licenses for the sale of all alcoholic beverages to be drunk on the premises and one additional license for the sale of all alcoholic beverages not to be drunk on the premises in said town;

Emergency Preamble Adopted.

An engrossed Bill relative to designating a certain bridge in the town of Falmouth as the Deputy John Robert Kotfila Jr. memorial bridge (see House, No. 3170, amended), having been certified by the Senate Clerk to be rightly and truly prepared for final passage and containing an emergency preamble,-- was laid before the Senate; and, a separate vote being taken in accordance with the requirements of Article LXVII of the Amendments to the Constitution, the preamble was adopted in concurrence, by a vote of 2 to 0.

A Bill to address challenges faced by municipalities and state authorities resulting from COVID-19 (House, No. 4598) ,-- was read.

The Senator from Essex and Middlesex, Mr. Tarr, moved that when the Senate adjourns today, it do so in memory of Andrew Galanis of Ipswich, Massachusetts, who died on February 28, 2020 at the age of 88.

Andy was an active and admired member of the Ipswich community. In 1950, Andrew graduated Ipswich High School and after taking courses at Bentley University he returned to help out at the family business, the Agawam Diner. He will also be remembered for bringing coffee and clam chowder to his children’s tailgates. Additionally, he spoke proudly of his children and grandchildren’s accomplishments while hanging up articles about them in the diner. Andy will be remembered for his remarkable personality and lasting impact on all those who had the pleasure to meet him.

Andy is survived by his beloved wife, Georgia; children, son John and his wife, Christine Galanis; daughter, Ethel and her husband Paul DePasquale; and daughter Angela and her husband, Barry Mitchell; and six grandchildren, Andrew Galanis, Constantine Galanis, Derek DePasquale, Nicholas DePasquale, Andrew Mitchell, and Hannah Mitchell.
