MONDAY, APRIL 13, 2020

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Met at twelve minutes past eleven o'clock A.M. (Mr. Rush in the Chair) (having been appointed by the President, under authority conferred by Senate Rule 4, to perform the duties of the Chair).

The Chair (Mr. Rush), members, guests and staff then recited the pledge of allegiance to the flag.

Petitions were severally presented and referred as follows:

By Ms. DiZoglio, a petition (accompanied by bill) (subject to Joint Rule 12) of Diana DiZoglio, Lenny Mirra, Patricia D. Jehlen, Adam G. Hinds and other members of the General Court for legislation to establish a Massachusetts Paycheck Protection Program (PPP) for businesses ineligible for the comparable federal PPP; and

By Mr. Timilty (accompanied a bill) (subject to Joint Rule 12) of Walter F. Timilty, John C. Velis, Anne M. Gobi, Diana DiZoglio and others for legislation to protect institutions of higher education that provide emergency aid in response to COVID-19;

Emergency Preamble Adopted.

An engrossed Bill establishing a sick leave bank for Racquel Jean-Louis, an employee of the Suffolk sheriff's department (see House, No. 4585, amended), having been certified by the Senate Clerk to be rightly and truly prepared for final passage and containing an emergency preamble,-- was laid before the Senate; and, a separate vote being taken in accordance with the requirements of Article LXVII of the Amendments to the Constitution, the preamble was adopted in concurrence, by a vote of 4 to 0.

The bill was signed by the Acting President (Mr. Rush) and sent to the House for enactment.

Petitions were severally referred, in concurrence, as follows, to wit:

Petition (accompanied by bill, House, No. 4635) of Ruth B. Balser and Mindy Domb relative to the reporting of COVID-19 positive cases and mortalities in long term care facilities and elder housing;

Petition (accompanied by bill, House, No. 4634) of Liz Miranda and others relative to financial assistance, health care access and small business grants in response to the COVID-19 outbreak;
