Adjournment in Memory of Jordie Saucerman.

The Senator from Plymouth and Norfolk, Mr. O'Connor moved that when the Senate adjourns today it do so in memory of Jordie Saucerman.

On July 2nd, 2020, Jordie Saucerman passed away at the age of 66, surrounded by close friends and family. Co-founder of The Company Theater in Norwell, Jordie Saucerman was beloved by her students, families, staff members and community. Her passing is an incredible loss to The Company Theater, Greater Boston Theater Communities, South Shore, as well as to everyone who knew her.

Born and raised in Southern Indiana, she first appeared on stage at the age of seven. Throughout high school she received numerous awards and recognitions for her performances. She pursued her passion for the arts at Emory University in Atlanta, Georgia. There, she met Zoe Bradford, with whom she would move to Boston after her graduation to begin dramatic coaching and playwriting.

By the mid 1970s, Jordie was hired as an assistant director for the youth organization "The Freelance Players" based in Jamaica Plain. This prestigious organization invited Jordie to author her first adaptation of a children's musical, "Great Expectations." This musical quickly became a sold-out hit, performing for audiences at The Boston Public Library and Wheelock College.

In 1978, Jordie Saucerman and Zoe Bradford founded The Company Theater allowing Jodie to accomplish her life-long dream of providing students with education and entertainment through the performing arts. The Company Theater quickly became a safe-haven of acceptance, a welcoming family on and off-stage. Jordie's kind heart, generosity, and infectious laughter drew everyone to her, and made her a trusted friend to everyone she encountered.

Jordie amassed over 200 directing credits as well as numerous student projects and workshops since founding The Company Theater. She was awarded for her work as a codirector five times by The New England Theater Conference. Alongside life-long friend Zoe Bradford, she co-authored over six original theater works and adaptations such as *A Christmas Carol, It's a Wonderful Life, Rascals,* and the Moss Hart award winning *Gloryland the America Show.*

Jordie co-founded The Academy of the Company Theater in 1987, which offers summer workshops and theatrical productions for students ages 7 to 19. During these summer workshops Jordie served as Camp Director, guided counselors in training, and created a unique, energy charged atmosphere.

The Company Theater obtained its permanent home in 1992 in Norwell, Massachusetts where Jordie was able to provide support, guidance and structure to students who faced physical and emotional challenges. She had a rare ability to nurture young talent and make everyone feel accepted for who they were.

Jordie is survived by her beloved spouse Sally Ashton Forrest, life-long friend Zoe Bradford of Hingham, her sister Alicia Cochenour and her husband, Bob. Her sister-in-law Beth McDonough and her husband Michael of Stoughton. Aunt of Robby, Aaron, and Victoria Cochenour, Elisabeth, Austin, and Charlotte Kunz. Also survived by countless friends, co-workers and extended family.

Jordie Saucerman brought to life the Company Theater's motto, "We are a family." Her legacy will live on in the hearts of countless performers, students, audience members, and friends
