Officer Sicknick was a veteran and New Jersey native who served in the New

Jersey Air National Guard.

Officer Sicknick joined the United States Capitol Police in July of 2008 and on his most recent assignment he served on the First Responders Unit. Officer Sicknick shared a passion for the outdoors and became a member of the mountain bike unit with Capitol Police, patrolling the grounds daily.

Officer Sicknick will be remembered for his bravery and service to our country as a member of the military and a United States Capitol Police Officer.
