The Senator from Plymouth and Norfolk, Mr. O'Connor, moved that when the Senate adjourns today, it adjourn in memory of John Flynn.

On May 7, 2021, John Flynn, known to his friends as Jack, of Watertown, Massachusetts, passed away peacefully at the age of 63, only a few weeks after his retirement from the position of Town Clerk and Chief Election Officer of Watertown.

For 26 years, John served Watertown with respect and compassion, carrying out his duties with professionalism, and serving as a direct link between residents and their local government. Prior to this role, Jack was the Deputy City Clerk and Principal Budget Analyst for the City of Cambridge, bringing his career of dedicated public service to a total of 41 years.

As Town Clerk, John played an important role in the lives of many. When issuing licenses and certificates – whether for births or deaths, John treated each resident with respect, offering sincere congratulations or words of comfort. He administered the oath of office for all appointed and elected officials, watching as generations of public servants took their first steps to protect and serve the community. John also took on the management of the ever-popular Faire on the Square for 10 years, helping to improve the quality of life and spirit of Watertown.

John was a beloved member of the Watertown community and local government, and his contributions will continue to bear fruit for years to come.

John was born and raised in Cambridge, surrounded by many loving relatives and friends. He attended Malden Catholic High School and went on to graduate from Merrimack College.

John cherished his close relationships with his extended family of cousins, nieces, and nephews, as well as his lifelong friendships with Kevin O'Connor and David Kale. John treasured his time spent in Marshfield with friends in the summer months.

As John built his career in public service, he not only collected statistics and records for his town, but he also collected friends. Many in the community who crossed paths with John would end up as his friend, thanks to his personality and good humor.

John had a great knack for politics and enjoyed following and discussing local and national campaigns, always eager to engage in political banter.

A devoted Red Sox fan, John held season tickets for many years and always looked forward to his annual Red Sox road trips, excited to return with souvenirs for the children in his life. Many will remember John for his profound loyalty to his baseball team.

John's ability to successfully navigate Watertown through the pandemic was

considered by many to be the crowning achievement of his long, distinguished career. But despite the high-stakes work, he was always known for what he called his "Irish sense of humor".

John was the beloved son of the late John and Theresa Flynn and the devoted nephew of the late Thomas J. Begley and his surviving wife Ruth Begley of Arlington. He was the loving cousin of Mary Gerardin of Stoneham, Carolyn Blair and her husband Paul of Wilmington, Thomas Begley and his wife Jill of Breckenridge, Colorado, Luke Begley and his wife Rachelle of Cambridge and Joanna Anderson and her late husband Michael of Bedford. John is also survived by many adoring cousins, especially Timmy and Sean Norton, as well as his many friends and colleagues who will miss him greatly.
